York Redeemed!

The good time has at last arrived, when York has proved true to her own interests, and ranged herself in line with the party of progress and good government in Canada.

We have not space to-day to review many interesting points of the great contest, but one word we may add. Last Friday night in the City Hall, Attorney General Blair closed an unusually bombastic speech with the words, "Electors of York, vote confidence in the Local Government, by electing the Liberal Candidate on the 29th," and York has given her answer.

To Mr. Temple we offer congratulations. He occupies a proud position as the representative in the Dominion Parliament of this fine constituency, and we feel that he will worthily wear the dignity the electors of York have conferred upon him.

A few short months ago, Mr. Temple was, without cause, dismissed from the position of Sheriff, by the parties whom he so ignominiously defeated yesterday. It was a sorry job for them and Mr. Temple's revenge now must indeed be sweet.

During the contest, the Telegraph which has so misled its party in this matter, and contributed so much to our success, wanted to know, "who was this Thomas Temple, anyway?" Our contemporary probably needs no light on this subject to-day.

Training Indians. A correspondent writing from Battledore, Northwest Territory, on this subject, says: "A few days ago I was invited by the Rev. Theo. Clarke, of the Methodist mission, to visit the Industrial School, established in Battledore for the education of Indian boys."

A Destructive Gale. The wind blew a hurricane all over England and the continent Sunday night and much damage was done in London. Many persons are injured. The glass roof of the Westminster Aquarium was demolished, causing a panic among the audience and several persons were hurt.

Creomated. A terrible affair occurred in the village of Curran, Ontario, Sunday night. Mrs. Beaulieu, wife of Eldon Beaulieu, merchant, died on Thursday, and her body was laid out for burial. Last evening the house caught fire and was totally consumed, with its contents.

Mr. A. W. Wilkinson's Death.

Death at any age in man, is a sad blow to those who have been his friends and associates, but in the young, it is especially felt.

One of the saddest deaths that has been our lot to record, is that of Mr. Arthur W. Wilkinson, one of Fredericton's most brilliant young men, and to which brief mention was made last week. It seems only a few weeks since Mr. Wilkinson, fresh in the bloom of youth, with the full flush of health and ambition, high hopes and brilliant aspirations left his native city, to pursue his medical studies at McGill College, Montreal.

Mr. Wilkinson was ill only a few days. He caught typhoid fever from a college friend whom he nursed. The news of his illness was quickly succeeded by the sad details of his death, and four parents, brothers, sisters, and friends, were thrown into mourning almost uncontrollably with grief that well might seem the heart.

The deceased was a son of Mr. Edw. Wilkinson, of this city. After passing through the Common Schools he entered the Collegiate School, and under Mr. Parkin's efficient training, soon developed a well balanced mind, and attracted the attention of his tutors and school mates, by the brilliancy of his ability.

Of the appreciation in which he was held in St. Andrews, the *Day Pilot* says:—"During the three years in which he resided in St. Andrews, by his high moral character and correct deportment, he won the admiration and respect of all those who knew him."

The Loss of the City of Columbus. The New York Herald, speaks out plainly on this subject, and apparently lays the blame for the loss of the ship, with over one hundred lives, among them five members of the Blythe family, of Woodstock, on the proper shoulders.

Among other things it says:—"In all the recorded calamities at sea there is not a worse story than that of the steamer driven straight upon the reefs at Gay Head, on Friday morning last. It is hard to realize the horror of such an event, the fearful fact of a hundred travellers, in great part women and children, and a few men, being slain almost instantaneously by the sea."

Fredrickton and Woodstock Water Works.

Mr. Crafts writes to the St. Croix Courier, some interesting statistics and comparisons on this subject, from which we make some extracts.

The Fredericton works are constructed upon what is called the direct pumping system, which means that the water is forced into the main pipes without the use of a reservoir or stand pipes. The machinery for doing this work at Fredericton is a duplex, compound condensing engine of a capacity of over one and a half million gallons per day, (1,200,000) raised 102 feet, the average rate of speed being 22 1/2 revolutions a minute.

The ordinary pressure for daily use is about forty pounds per square inch and there is always a surplus of steam pressure so that, in case of a fire, the engine can raise the water-pressure to eighty or one hundred pounds in ten or twenty minutes.

The works at Woodstock are built upon the same system, direct-pumping. The arrangement of the works and the style of the building is very different from those at Fredericton. The River St. John at a point where there is eight or nine feet of water at the lowest stage of the river, and its suction is taken from the river.

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GENERAL NEWS.

Strawberries are selling in New York at 10 cents each.

Armour & Co., of Chicago, slaughtered 1,020,000 hogs and 251,000 cattle last year. The Illinois Supreme Court has decided that contracts made on Sunday are valid and binding.

England and Wales employ 443,563 miners, of which number 351,793 are engaged in the coal pits.

It is said that the peculiar sunsets are caused by the sun trying to set by the new standard time.

Engineering in China has achieved a notable triumph in the construction of the bridge at Logan, over an arm of the China Sea. It is five miles long, built entirely of stone, has 700 arches, and is 70 feet high.

The Pillsbury flour mill at Minneapolis, has a milling capacity of five thousand and two hundred barrels of flour, and one hundred and eighty tons of offal per day. This is made from 70,000 bushels of wheat.

California wheat-growers are reckoning largely upon the completion of the Panama Canal, since it will shorten the long voyage to Europe. It is believed that it will reach a market. They believe that on the day the canal is opened California can defy the competition of India and Australia.

When a charge of criminal libel came up the other day, in a New York Court, the parties to the case being editors of rival papers, Justice Patterson remarked:—"If I'd known they were both editors I would not have issued the summons. If both are editors let them fight it out in their papers. What are the papers for?" The case was dismissed.

In 1878, Clara Venable, of Virginia, eloped with one Foster and went to Philadelphia. In 1881 Foster deserted his wife, who was left destitute with an infant. After making an unsuccessful appeal to her father for help, she went to New York, where she was taken to New York. Venable finally related, but was unable to find his daughter. He died last month, leaving \$30,000 to his daughter's child. Search is being made for it.

It is estimated that there is upward of one million bushels of wheat now in the country awaiting shipment west. All the available potato crops of the New Brunswick Railway and Maine Central Railroad have been brought into requisition for the forwarding of potatoes this winter.

Some time ago a married sister of Rogers Auld of Digby, N. S., fell into a well in Boston, awaiting trial for murder, was conveyed to a lunatic asylum at Halifax, the immediate cause of her derangement being grief at the accidental death of her brother.

An almost incredible crime was attempted lately near McCormick, on the Augusta and Knoxville Railroad. As one of the down trains was passing, a man named Rogers, an engineer, discovered a child on the track. He barely succeeded in stopping the train when only a few yards from the boy, who was found to be severely injured.
