That Cricket Match.

A very closely contested match game of the noble sport, was played on the grounds of the Woodstock Cricket Club on Thursday and Friday, the 2nd and 3rd insts., the contest being a picked team of the Fredericton Cricket Club and the Woodstock eleven. The wickets were pitched at 2 P. M., on Thursday. Captain Allen of the Fredericton team winning the toss sent Woodstock to bat. The Woodstock batsmen seemed peculiarly unlucky and were dispatched, after a short play, with a score of 34. Ketchum batted steadily and succeeded in running up a score of 11, which was the highest made in this innings by Woodstock. The home team now went to the bat and had run up a score of 120 when the last wicket fell. The highest score was obtained by Bliss, who carried his bat to the finish, running up the handsome total of 53. The home team immediately went to the bat with the determination to win back some of their lost laurels; and Woodstock and Dr. Sprague at the bat. Time was called at 6 o'clock, when Woodstock had obtained 30 runs for 5 wickets. On Thursday evening the visiting team was entertained by the Woodstock eleven, at Leo's dining hall, where oysters, fruits, cigars etc., were discussed. After the supper several toasts were proposed and responded to in a most elegant and hearty manner. Several of the more musical of each team kindly favored the company with choice selections, vocal and instrumental. Before parting "God Save the Queen" was lastly sung, all hands joined in accordance with the time honored custom. The others followed a la Thompson, the highest score being that of Allen, who was wicketed in the last wicket fell with a total of 28 for the Fredericton team, consequently Woodstock won the game by a score of 5 runs.
