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BOARD OF AGRICULTURE. Business of the Annual Meeting.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS. Report on the Stock Farm.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Board of Agriculture opened in the Assembly Clerk's Room, in the Parliament Buildings, on 10 A. M., on Thursday the 18th inst., Hon. D. McLellan, the President in the chair.

It affords me great pleasure to meet you at this annual meeting of the Board of Agriculture. Since we last met there has been some changes in the membership of the Board.

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The question may be asked: Where and how can land be obtained suitable for farming? It is really, I think, safe to say that there are several counties in this Province, containing large tracts of Government land which is well adapted for settlement, and can be obtained either under the Labor or Free Grants Acts.

Again you will hear it said that in many instances where new settlements have been opened, the outlook is so poor that the settlers were discouraged, and were forced through absolute necessity to leave and go back to the cities.

It appears to me that in the past there has been too much of a disposition on the part of some of our farmers, to dispose of a large portion of the produce of the farm, such as hay, oats, roots, &c., and in doing so they have ruined their farms to deterioration.

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annual sale of stock, at the Province Stock Farm, it must have been paid to all from the large attendance of those who came to buy, that there exist animals, and that the demand for the Province stock is yearly increasing.

I might add, that in my opinion, twice the number of calves could have been disposed of at that sale, at fairly good prices, and that to my mind is able to warrant a very considerable increase in the number of animals now on the farm.

The principle laid down by competent authorities is, in the first place, find out what you want to raise cattle for, whether for beef or for dairy purposes, or for both, and in the second place, ascertain which of the different breeds will do best in the climate of the locality where you reside, keeping in view the kind of pasturage land your farm contains.

Prof. Brown, already quoted, says in his opinion, the common cows of the country crossed with a thoroughbred Short horn bull will produce the best other cows for general purposes, and many of them will give as much milk as the best of the country.

In speaking of the Polled Angus cattle, Professor Brown says that for early maturing they are equal to the best of the country, but so far as their milk is concerned they are not equal to the other breeds.

From the opinions expressed by the gentlemen I have named, as well as others who gave testimony before the Board of Commissioners, it will be seen that there is a diversity of opinion regarding the selection of the different breeds of cattle, but there is one thing they all agree in, that it is in the interest of the farmer to improve the breed of his cattle by breeding to a thoroughbred bull of some kind, and to keep on until he finds out what breed is most suitable for his local conditions.

At the meeting in December last, I called the attention of the Board to the fact that the results from the Province Stock Farm did not warrant so large an outlay, and asked to have the matter inquired into with a view to ascertain whether the fault lay in the management of the farm, or in the quality of the stock.

Your committee are of the opinion, that the increased demand for thoroughbred stock will warrant the purchase of an additional number of animals, even to the extent of doubling the stock as at present on the Farm.

The report was adopted. The Board occupied the remainder of the session in examination in detail of the Secretary's accounts, and sitting till 10 o'clock.
