

Better try a Dash of Good Blood. Every little while some one suggests whether the best way to improve the common stock of the country would not be, after all that has been said about the various improved breeds, to enter upon a systematic course of selection, breeding the best to the best, and so on. It is urged that for this improvement the materials exist upon every farm, and that as all could engage in the work and no stragglers be left in the rear, the improvement would be rapid and of very marked character. Undoubtedly very much might be accomplished in this way, as the common stock, socalled, already has very much of good ways secured with a view of bringing the chief merit of the so-called common stock of to-day is due to remote crosses of good blood, and if these crosses were nearer by and more numerous, their merits would be greater. It is the frequency, generally, and the nearness of these crosses

which make certain individuals of the common stock better than others. But when it comes to breeding the best among the common stock of the best, it is a mistake to suppose that the materials for the great improvement desired can be found upon every farm and that every farmer can join in the work.
