Machinery is doing a vast amount Machinery is doing a vast amount of labor for man, but horses are not dispensed with, on the contrary their number is increasing in this country every year. Not only so, but their quality is improving, both for the carriage and heavy work. No other creature is so valuable a servant to man. He is often ill-treated, not so much from intention as from ignorance of what is right. Don't build the manger so high as to make it unnatural, and therefore painful, for the horse is a grazing animal, constructed to take food from the ground. When the head is down near to the surface of the earth, the swallowing muscles are in a position to do their work; but when the head is raised four or five feet high the muscles are restrict.
