THE FOUNTAIN.

Report of the Citizens' Committee to the Subscribers. On the 7th April last, at a meeting of the City Council, the following was proposed and carried unanimously:

On the 7th April last, at a meeting of the City Council, the following was proposed and carried unanimously: "On the motion of Alderman Wiley, permission is granted to his Worship the Mayor, to place a public drinking and ornamental fountain on Phoenix Square, at the expense of himself and other subscribers, the subject to be the property of the Corporation when completed, and to be kept in repair and supplied with water by the Corporation."

The Mayor consulted with Messrs. Leonard W. Johnston, Harry Chestnut and Fred. B. Edgecombe, and an earnest interest was manifested by these gentlemen in the object, and we at once proceeded to organize and form ourselves into a Committee to collect subscriptions and carry out the work.

What ever objection may have been expressed by the work was progressing, the Committee believe now that it is finished, it is with the public approval, and by so saying that the Square will no longer be kept, especially in the early spring months, in a filthy state, the receipt of rubbish and puddles of water, rendering the whole of the Hall not only very inconvenient, but highly objectionable in several ways.

Now that the work is done and the services of the Committee are concluded, it is the intention at the first meeting of the Council in November, to hand over the Fountain to the City, in accordance with the expressed terms of the Resolution as given above, and it is their desire that as many of the subscribers as can make it convenient will favor the occasion with their presence.
