### The Sunbury Election.

Mr. Arthur Glazier, the Government candidate in Sunbury, as we anticipated, has been re-elected. Mr. Morrow made a plucky fight, and polled three hundred and sixty-five unpurchased votes, while Mr. Glazier's majority, we have no hesitation in saying, was procured by the most flagrant corruption. The Government were bound to win at any cost. They recognized in the contest, an important issue, and money was lavishly expended to carry the constituency. All the party hacks were called into requisition; the bribery brigade were out in full force; Government contractors and officials, exerted their influence for Mr. Glazier, and the Attorney General personally solicited votes for the successful candidate. Before such odds as these, a more popular man than Mr. Morrow would have been compelled to succumb; such a torrent of corruption would have borne down any man in the County. That Mr. Morrow polled such a large vote, is astonishing, when the influence used against him are considered. The Government and Mr. Glazier are welcome to all the satisfaction they can take out of a triumph purchased so dearly.

### The Normal School.

The *Monteur Acadin* says:—"After a few months trial, the Board of Education was convinced that the abolition of the 'French Department of the Normal School' was a false step, and one which greatly retarded the progress of public education among the French. Now we learn from 'reliable authority' that the Board of Education has re-established this Department."

Some time ago, we pointed out the injustice done the Acadians, by the closing of this Department, and censured the Government and temporary Chief Superintendent for their hostility to the people concerned. We are glad to learn that our faithful exposure of their dishonest tactics has borne good fruit. We therefore congratulate the French upon their restoration, for it is essential to the well-being of their schools. We would be wanting also in duty, did we not congratulate the Government and temporary Chief Superintendent for the readiness with which they acknowledged their blunder, and admitted their inability to conceive anything new, which the experience of a few months does not prove a mistake. It seems that if the country cannot confide in their ability, it is tolerably safe in their weakness, for they are exceedingly sensitive to a little pressure. Why the Government organs gave no notice of their opening of this department, is easily understood. They are growing tired of recording the numerous backbones of the Government. We should like to know, however, under what conditions this school is reopened; if the French Student teachers are to be treated as heretofore, or on their merits. The *Monteur* throws some light on this subject, but if correct in its information, we must again condemn the regulations of this department.

### He Can't Remember.

Our youthful friend of the *Courier*, is unfortunate in his application to the FARMER, of the *Post's* remark, that "only three newspapers in the Province stood by Sir John in 1873, viz: the *Fredericton Reporter*, *St. Croix Courier*, and *Chignecto Post*; with every other newspaper going with the party in power."

We may remind our young friend, whose personal recollection of events so far back in history, is probably quite indistinct, that the FARMER was not published until Sept., 1870, so could not have been included either in the list of naughty papers that forsook Sir John, or yet in the catalogue of those remaining faithful to him. This little fact completely upsets the theory of the *Courier*, to whom we say in conclusion, that the FARMER proposes pursuing a course consistent with its "own sweet will," and without regard to the suggestions of its youthful and unsophisticated friend of the *Courier*. Our contemporary's reasonable compliments however, are tenderly reciprocated.

### Colonization.

We print on our first page, an interesting letter from Rev. M. F. Richard, parish priest at St. Louis, Kent, on this important subject. Father Richard is an authority on colonization. He it was who originated the settlement of Rogersville in Northumberland County. Ten years ago, there was scarcely a dwelling there; now there are more than a hundred prosperous families, and a valuable accumulation of property. The settlement will ever remain a monument to the energy and intelligence of its projector.

While we do not quite agree with all that Father Richard has written, we give him credit for expressing a fearless and unprejudiced opinion, and shall be glad to hear from him again on colonization, or any other practical subject.

### The Woodstock Mayoralty.

There will be a warmly contested election in March for the Mayoralty of Woodstock between the present Mayor, Mr. Randolph K. Jones, and Mr. Harry Connell, of the well-known firm of Connell Bros., iron founders. Both gentlemen are popular, have extensive business connections, and many warm personal friends. Mr. Jones has held the office for three years, having been elected, if we mistake not, in every case without opposition. There is no particular complaint that he neglected the duties of his office, but an important section of the citizens have been dividing the honors, and have induced Mr. Connell to enter the field. The latter gentleman has been a councillor, and made a good run for the mayoralty, against Mr. L. P. Fisher, several years ago. His friends are enthusiastic.

It may be incidentally mentioned, that during a corporate existence of nearly thirty years, Woodstock has had but three gentlemen elected to the office, and the very first foundry was founded in the city. Among his varieties will be found:

### The Stock Farm.

The Albert Maple Leaf thinks that the Stock Farm will be abolished when the Legislature meets. Such a course would be in direct opposition to the wishes of the majority of the farmers of the Province. At the recent meeting of the Board of Agriculture, the opinion among the members was unanimous in favor of retaining the Farm, and increasing its sphere of usefulness.

The *Maple Leaf* evidently expresses the wish of Hon. Mr. Turner, who from the first, has been an opponent of the Farm. In his opinion ought not to prevail. The farmers as a class, have a right to recognition at the hands of the Government. They constitute the backbone of the country, and may properly demand whatever benefits the maintenance of a Stock Farm will confer on them and their pursuit. The argument of economy cannot be successfully urged on the Stock Farm question. The accounts show that the Farm has cost the Province only \$1300 above the receipts during 1884, and this amount could be entirely wiped out by more economical management on the part of the Government.

With this fact before us, we believe a Stock Farm can be run in New Brunswick, not only without loss, but at a positive gain.

### Lennox.

This Ontario constituency during the past few years, has been brought prominently before the political public of Canada for various reasons. In the first place, it was Sir Richard Cartwright's old constituency, he having been returned to the Commons by it in 1867; it re-elected him in 1872, and again in 1873, when he accepted the position of Finance Minister in the McKenzie Government. In the general election of 1878, the Knight of deficits was defeated in Lennox, and the County was captured by the Conservatives. It was one of the three constituencies that did themselves the honor of returning Sir John A. Macdonald in the general elections of 1882. Sir John, however, resigned his seat for that County, and in the election that followed, Mr. Allison, a Grit, was elected by a majority of four, but he resigned to succeed Sir John in the Province, and was re-elected in 1884.

It was again re-elected on the 5th inst. as opposed by Mr. Prayn, his unsuccessful rival in the previous contest, and defeated by a majority of forty-five. In this election, Mr. Allison was aided by the most prominent Grit orators of Canada, including Mr. Blake, Sir Richard Cartwright, Mr. Chilton and Mr. Paterson of Brant, but all their oratory was unavailing.

The connexion of such prominent men as Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir Richard Cartwright with Lennox, has naturally, given Lennox great notoriety in the political world, but the wholesale commission of bribery, which has marked the contests on the part of the Grits in that constituency, has also been an important factor in placing Lennox so prominently before the people of Canada. Sir Richard Cartwright is a wealthy man, and it was largely because of his money, and not on account of his popularity, for he possesses very little of that commodity either personally or politically, that he was able to hold Lennox from 1867 to 1878. The Conservatives have redeemed the constituency against the most powerful organization their opponents could bring to bear, and in face of the sympathy that would naturally be extended to Mr. Allison, because of his having been unseated.
