He accepted the office in October, 1869, and was at once elected to Parliament as member for North Renfrew. This seat he held until the close of Parliament, and he was then returned for Vancouver, for which constituency he sat until his final retirement from politics in 1874. During his occupancy of the position of Finance Minister he devoted himself to the work of readjusting the currency, and also prepared and carried through Parliament an important Banking Act. His first wife died in 1874, and on June 14, 1875, he married Emily Louisa, relict of Hon. Justice Sullivan, of Toronto. After his retirement from politics he continued to devote himself

to financial matters, for some time serving as President of the City Bankof Montreal. He was the author of pamphlets on "Religious Endowments in Canada," on "Our Political History from 1841 to 1854," and on various other subjects. He also published a short time ago a volume of "Reminisences," a valuable contribution to the political history of his time. In 1878, he was chosen in the room of Hon. L. A. Wilmol, deceased, to be one of the three arbitrators to pass upon the






