A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY!

A New Brunswick at Halifax shoots his own Daughter, and commits Suicide.

The Sad Result of Lunacy.

(From the Halifax Mail.) A double tragedy was enacted in this city Tuesday morning, the 14th inst., a crime unparalleled in the history of the province, and which has sent a thrill of horror through the whole populace. Yesterday's development showed that the horrible crime had been planned for weeks if not months, and that the original idea of the poor fellow was the murder of a whole family consisting of his favorite daughter. The author of the terrible crime was Edward Withers, chief clerk of the Customs Department. He shot and killed his daughter, and within an hour afterwards died from the effects of a poison administered to himself. Withers had for years been regarded as crank, and for months past as man verging upon insanity if not actually insane. He had a delusion that every one of his enemies only awaited an opportunity to murder him. He had a particular aversion to Catholics and indeed to every one else not an ultra Protestant, and imagined...

THE WIFE AND ALLYMENTS. Who would destroy the man verging upon insanity on the first opportunity. He was armed with a 32 calibre revolver and a couple of knives with dagger blades. He also imagined that he was a private agent of the government, and that he was to be promoted to position and increased salary as fast as he expected, and hence wrote many exceedingly personal letters to members of the government and officials of the customs department. Other letters abusing the government and its officers were published in the press, but few, if any of them, were published. This became another grievance to him, and for some time past he construed almost everything appearing in the local papers as personal reflections on himself. He also got into the habit of reading papers and subscribed for the St. John Telegraph. But he soon imagined that that paper was abusing personal references to him also, and declared that even the St. John papers had entered into the conspiracy to wound him to death.

His conduct in his office for months past has been that of an insane man, while his private life has been a hell upon earth, and his family has been driven to Mount Hope asylum long ago. A few days ago he became very melancholy. On Saturday he called upon Collector Ross, asked for a piece of paper to write upon his resignation, as follows: "I hereby tender my resignation. I am not prompted by anybody in this, but do it of my own free will. He then signed a book, which is kept for the purpose, writing after his name, "as by law." The collector took no notice of the signature, but on Monday he called on Sunday Surgeon Caldwell visited him and endeavored to disabuse his mind of the delusions. On Monday he called on the collector, withdrew his resignation, and said he would take three or four days rest until the present excitement had blown over. He had no money to go to the country, and he was obliged to stay in his room from his own pocket. The collector was then convinced that he ought not to be at large, and that he was a dangerous lunatic, and took steps to get him in the asylum. That takes time. There is

Forms have to be made out, and sworn to, etc. While all this had to be done, maniacs were kept in the room at large, the result sometimes being a terrible tragedy. Meanwhile a reign of terror had prevailed in his little home—cottages No. 3, Chestnut place, Quinlan, R. C. Carr, and family have long known the man, who he was armed with a revolver and knives and that he frequently intimidated and threatened to do something to his wife, two sons, Charles Edward, aged 24, George, now with the military, aged 22, and William, aged 19, and his wife, his only daughter, was his wife. A year ago or more he procured a revolver. His wife got possession of the same, and he afterwards hid it.
