His cries and the noise occasioned by the fall brought other employees to witness the young man was. He was found to be in a terrible state, blood flowing in torrents from the top of his head, his mouth and his feet. How he escaped being completely crushed is only known by a merciful Providence. His skull was badly fractured; nearly all the teeth in the front of his mouth were broken and pieces of them sticking in his cheek. One arm was fractured, and one foot almost crushed into jelly, the sole of the boot being torn completely off. He was sent to the Hospital, and is recovering.
