



The disease was checked and the deaths ceased.

Packing Eggs for Winter Use.

As the price of eggs is usually low at this season, a large number may be packed and stowed away until prices become higher. It is not necessary to keep eggs six months, though they may be kept a year with care. Prices fluctuate very much, and three months make quite a difference. Opinions differ as to which is the best method of preserving eggs.
