They are very handsome animals, one year old, weighing about 120 lbs., and 210 lbs. The sheep came from the whole distance, 1,200 miles, by express and arrived in good condition. They were bred by Henry Arkell at the Farm farm, a few miles Guelph, and undoubtedly are magnificent animals. Their introduction into Stanley should do very much for the improvement of the sheep in that locality.

Mr. Othar Dupuy of Nashwaak Village, has with remarkable success in raising a variety of potato known as the "Dakotah Red." He obtained a pound of seed from Mr. James Tibbitts of Fredericton in the spring of 1884, and raised them also three months before going to the States. He had had about 100 lbs. in 1885 from one bushel he got 523 bushels, and this year from 1 bushel he raised 72 bushels. This is a new variety, well adapted to our soil and when acclimated will be an excellent table potato. It grows to an immense size, is sound and dry. Mr. Dupuy brought a bushel of his potatoes to the Agricultural Society and the Secretary of Agriculture gathered them up to form a part of the New Brunswick exhibit at the Colonial Exhibition.

It has been reported that the prospective Prince of Wales is thinking of wedding an American lady, the editor of the Capital, hastens to present Fredericton's claims for the honor of a royal alliance.
