THE STANLEY FAIR.

Splendid weather greeted the Stanley people last Wednesday, on the occasion of their Annual Agricultural Fair. The attendance was large as usual, and the show of agricultural and dairy product stock and domestic manufactures was excellent. Quite a number of people were present from the city, among them, Mr. Temple M. P., who was very cordially received. During the day, in a neat speech, he formally presented the two very handsome and highly prized Oxford Down Sheep imported by him from Ontario for the Stanley Society. Mr. Temple's kindly act was received with hearty cheers. The sheep were on the grounds during the day, and were universally admired. The prize list was made up at 4 o'clock, and announced as follows by Mr. Harry Backwith of Fredericton, President of the Society:

More Capital Needed.

One of the chief difficulties from which farmers suffer is lack of available capital. Many who have this combine the advantage of the trader and the farmer. A fertile farm all paid for insures them a home, and with a few hundred dollars as outside capital, they can do a business in buying and selling, which will give greater profit than the farm itself, which is perhaps one of the very best ways to bring the farm up to a higher state of productiveness. This is especially true when grain has to be sold irregularly. At such times the farmer should be able to find some way of disposing of grain in a more profitable manner than selling it for money. It needs good judgment to do this, but not better than is required in hundreds of other farm operations. The great difficulty of making money as surely as by growing crops, and mixing stock for feeding or fattening and feeding stock, grain or fodder that would otherwise be wasted. Why they lack to do this is the ready money. Chances to buy favorably do not wait long. Some would like fewer facilities in every year, but they take them up and often make a good business out of it as a go-between in doing what most farmers who had the money could better do for themselves.

Shipping Apples to Europe.

The demand for American apples in Great Britain has increased of late years to such an extent that for the season beginning August, 1885, and ending May, 1886, the total shipments to the three principal ports, Liverpool, London, and Glasgow, aggregated 862,000 barrels. The magnitude of the business has attracted the attention of the home and foreign markets, and inquiries have been addressed to us for this information. These facts induce us to believe that instructions as to the proper course to be pursued will be welcome to a large number of growers throughout the apple growing district.

The most important point to be observed is the packing. The barrels should be new ones made for the purpose. The filling should be done on a platform of boards, and not on the ground. All worms or bruised fruit should be rejected. The size is not a factor in the requirements for its proper transportation, and numerous inquiries have been addressed to us for this information. These facts induce us to believe that instructions as to the proper course to be pursued will be welcome to a large number of growers throughout the apple growing district.
