American manufacturers now, as a general rule, have two prices, one for the home market and one for Canada, the latter being the lower. Under exceptional circumstances it has even paid American manufacturers to export goods to Canada, at less than cost price. The principal justification of the National Policy is to prevent Canada being made a slaughter market for the United States. Certain importers now complain that the Canadian Customs Sections 68 and 69 of the Cus. ernment and eight Opposition. toms Act, of 1883 read as follows:

68. Where any duty ad valorem is imposed for duty shall be the fair market value thereof.

69.
