Sir Charles Tupper, in a talk with the representative of a New York paper, found fault with that part of President C'eveland's message, which endeavors to place the responsibility for the irratation arising from the protection given the Canadian fisheries upon Canadian officials. The Government of Canada he said had given the fishermen of the United States the free use of the fisheries for the year upon condition that the matter should be submitted to the Senate for friendly settlement by an international commission. The Gloucester fishermen declared hostility to the negotiating of any treaty made by which they would be entitled to fish in Canadian waters, on the ground that they did not require to go into Canadian waters to obtain fish. The Senate rejected the proposal for an international commission, and, added Sir Charles " we then, in the most temperate manner possible, enforced the treaty of 1818, upon which our Government was thrown back by the action of the United States, with the result that the season has been the most disastrous for American fishermen, who sponsible for the failure to provide for through a joint commission.
