The Haldimand Election. To those who know something of the political history of the County of Haldimand, Ontario, the election of Mr. Colter, the Grit candidate, there last Wednesday, by the comparatively small majority of 117, was no surprise. The constituency has never been anything else but Grit. Col. Thompson who represented it from confederation, down to the day of his death last spring, was preceded in the representation by his father. In 1867 Col. Thompson's majority was 369, in 1872 and 1874, he was elected by acclamation, in 1878 his majority was 166, and in 1882 he de feated Mr. Merritt, the Conservative candidate in the recent contest, by majority of 126. In fact, Haldimand has always been Grit, and in Wednesday's election, chose to remain Grit. That is about the English of it. The result of the contest leaves the proportionate strength of parties in the Commons, just the same, while the Grit majority of 126, in 1882, is cut down to 117, in 1886. It was claimed and feared by the Grit press, that the addition of 125 Indians to the voter's list would ensure the suc cess of the Government candidate, but as nearly as we can learn, the Indians have cast in their lot with the Grit party, until intelligence, christianity and civilization shall have rescued them from such an unholy alliance.
