"Nor can there be any mistake as to the meaning of the warning issued by the Marine and Fisheries Department of Canada. That official notice forbids all foreign fishing vessels from entering our territorial waters, bays or harbors, except for shelter, repairs, wood or water." The Adams having openly violated the regulation, she laid herself open to seizure, and must take the consequences.

The bill provides for the seizure and sale of vessels violating its provisions and prescribes heavy fines and severe penalties for resisting or aiding in resisting an officer of the United States while engaged in making such seizure. A duplicate of Mr. Dingley's bill was introduced in the Senate by Senator Frye of Maine.
