Agriculture. Brood Mares. The thought that any mare is suitable to breed from has given us a large class of horses with impaired constitutions, and carrying about with them the taint of inherited tendencies.

Regularity in Feeding. We waste tons of hay every year by careless methods of feeding, and retard growth by not feeding regularly.

It is much easier to breed diseased than healthy tendencies. There is in all nature the drawing back, and the natural condition is health, and usefulness can be made to improve.

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Pure Air in the Stable. We have repeatedly urged the importance of providing warm, sunny stables and barns.

Curing Hay. A frequent mistake in hay-making is to overdry the hay. Not only is the hay better when housed or staked as soon as possible after cutting as it will keep, but the risk of getting the crop damaged by rains is avoided.

Thinning Fruit. Whenever thinned judiciously thinning fruit always pays; but it requires considerable courage when the trees are laden with young fruit to go over and pull off and throw away a considerable portion of the fruit.

Stacking the day it is cut if possible. In good hay weather this can be done with the right management.

Soap Suds for Insects. Not all insects can be killed readily by the use of common soap suds, but many species can be and it is so simple a remedy that we feel like advising every farmer and gardener to keep a tub of it constantly on hand for use during the summer.
