The Nova Scotia Elections.

The Opposition in many counties were taken by surprise. In but very few cases was anything like a thorough canvass of the constituencies possible, and in none of them was adequate opportunity afforded for discussing fully the effects of repeal. Joined to these were a number of minor ones, that all assisted in bringing about the general result.

The question arises, what are the secessionists going to do with their victory, now that they have won it? They have carried the Province by a large majority through among their nominal supporters there are several that have publicly declared themselves opposed to repeal.

Some years ago, large numbers of girls came from the Provinces for domestic work, and many were most valuable servants and positions were easy to obtain for them.
