

Among those who sent congratulatory telegrams to Premier Fielding on the night of his victory in Nova Scotia, was Premier Blair of New Brunswick. Mr. Fielding expects that his repeal movement will extend to this Proyince, and repeal with him, he hopes, is only the forerunner of Maritime Union. Mr Blair therefore, in congratulating Mr. Fielding, the 'secessionist, gives his sympathy and countenance to a movement for the separation of New Brunswick from the Union, and its annexation to Nova Scotia. This would of course mean the dismantlement of Frederictor as the seat of Government, and the removal of all the public institutions from this city. Our splendid new Parliament Buildings would be closed up, there would be no Infantry School, no Suof the Legislature, and possibly no University or Normal School.

Mr. Blair's organ rises to remark in connexion with this matter, that the question of repeal must soon have place in our local politics, which we presume is a gentle hint from Mr. Blair, that he intends following up his telegram to Mr. Fielding, by something more substantial.
