Commerce of the World.

Russia exports tallow, flax, flour, iron, linseed, lard, hides, wax, duck, cordage, bristles, furs and potatoes.

China exports tea, silk, opium, mack, ginger, borax, zinc, silks, canes, fill, green work, ivory ware and porcelain.

Turkey exports opium, silks, drugs, gums, dried fruits, tobacco, wines, camels' hair, carpets, shawls, camlets and morocco.

Germany exports wool, woollen goods, linen, rags, corn, timber, iron, lead, tin, flax, hemp, wines, wax, tallow and cattle.

Italy exports corn, oil, flax, flour, wines, essences, dyestuffs, drugs, fine marble, soap, paintings, engravings, molasses and salt.

Fast-walking.

The attention of breeders will be called frequently to the neglect of teaching colts and young horses to walk.

The walking gait should be the first gait developed and perfected by the trainer, and after a rapid, clean, strong walk is acquired, the trotting gait should be attended to, and brought to a good degree of proficiency.

Horses may be made to attain almost incredible speed at this way of going if due care is observed. We have known numerous road-bred horses walk four or five miles in an hour, and many, in fact, most well-bred road horses, could be taught to cover greater distances than this in the same time if it were not for the pernicious custom (as we think) of putting the colts to the trots as soon as they are really broke.

Every farmer knows that he can do a better job of work—plowing or harrowing—with a fast walking team which makes the dirt fly than with a slow one. The saving on a farm when the horses walk three miles an hour, or even when they walk two miles and a half, is 20 per cent, or in other words, the fast team can rest a whole day in the week and yet do as much work as the slow team—do it easier and do it better. In times when the work is pressing or the weather uncertain, the fast team is a treasure. While every effort has been made to increase the speed of the trotter, the draft horse men have regarded either the mule or walking speed. It is a very great mistake to suppose that the draft horse should not be trained to walk rapidly. We have been breeding to a Percheron for four years that often walks nine miles in one hour and fifty minutes, over a hilly road, and his colts are all rapid walkers. Let us not stop to spend it in poking along with a team that can not get their heads up. The heavy man whose exertion is a burden actually works harder than the brisk, rapid worker.—Wallace's Monthly.

General Crop Prospects.

A report prepared for the Farmer's Review indicates that the prospect of drought will have a very serious effect upon all the late crops. The spring wheat outlook has been in a woe since improved, and the average condition of the crop has declined since July 1, when it was expected that the probable total wheat yield of the United States would not exceed a round total of 2,000,000,000 bushels. The tenor of later reports indicate that this estimate will have to be reduced by from ten to fifteen million bushels. The reports from Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Dakota do not indicate average yields of six to ten bushels to the acre, and in some places entirely ruined. Corn is reported very uneven, and while looking clean, is in need of rain, and a shortage in the yield is threatened. The oat crop will fall short of an average yield. The pastures in all the southwestern States are reported as short and in large sections ruined by the drought.

There is still a shrinkage in the price of beef all around. Good to prime steers are selling in New York for sixty cents a hundred less than a year ago. There has been a serious break in the live cattle market of Great Britain. Prices have dropped from one to one and a half cents a pound, and off of refrigerator beef still more. The supply in Liverpool and London is heavy and trade stagnant. Here
