The Interprovincial Convention.

To-morrow at Quebec, the Premiers of all the Provinces of Canada, except British Columbia and Prince Edward Island, will meet in convention, just for what, we have not yet clearly un derstood. The meeting has been called by Mr. Mercier, Premier of Quebec, and no doubt the gentlemen composing the convention will have a very pleasant time. We do not know that they have been charged by the people they represent, to propose any new scheme, or outline any new policy, and certainly the Provincial Legislatures with the exception o that of Quebec, have neither authorized the holding of the convention, nor suggested the need for such a meeting. The people of Canada seem tolerably well satisfied with the general management of public affairs by the Dominion Government, at least they so express themselves whenever occasion is offered at the polls, and why the leaders of the Local Governments should meet to seriously propound new policies, or suggest radical changes, does not very clearly appear. We have harbored the idea that the powers and duties of the local legislatures are unmistakeably outlined by the constitution, but it may be that the talented gentlemen who lead these bodies, find the field too cramped and narrow, for the exercise of the great ability they undoubtedly possess. A remedy for this would be their accession to the Dominion Parliament, where the field is wide and the rewards greater.
