





Another disadvantage that the farmers labors under -the outcome of greater ability possessed by men in other industries-is the fact that improvement in methods of manufacture, trade, transportation and distribution has been very much more rapid than in farming. During the past fifty years the power of one man to turn raw products into manufactured goods and distribute them to consumers, through the introduction of improved machinery and application of scientific discoveries, has increased from five to one hundred or more times. We have made no such advance in growing crops. It is true the introduction of large implements. and the binder and header, has increased the capacity of one man tanfold in growing and harvesting wheat Kenzie, 2nd and in haying machinery to nearly as great an extent in making hay. There 2nd, is still another factor that is detrimental to the interests of the farmer, and that is the exhaustion of the virgin fertility of the soil. Except in the older settled parts, farming has been largely of the pioneer order, which means clearing up the land and cropping it in such a way as to produce a crop with the least labor, regardless of the exhaustion and loss of the fertility of the soil, compelling us now to adopt some system of fertilizaation that is necessarily expensive to make the land produce as much as it

It is reported that the British Government have decided, for the present to discontinue the importation of Canadian horses for the army. In a previous issue we described the classes of 2nd; W McK-nzie, 3rd. horses demanded for the British army. and showed that suitable animals were extremely scarce. The consignments from Canada already made have given excellent satisfaction; but the present complaint is that our horses are too dear. One cause of the high price is 2nd; D Innes, 3rd. the expense incurred in travelling over so large a territory for so small a number of suitable horses. Our farmers should not relax their efforts in breeding the class of horses required for army purposes, for such animals 2nd. are also best suited for all other purposes, except as heavy drafts, and there will always be an active demand Duthee, 2ud. for them whether required for the Brit ish army or rot. Even granting that a good class of horses is bred, which is not suitable for cavalry or artillery purposes, a demand for army horses would leave a vacancy which could readily be filled from the class unsuited for the army, the consequences being that the prices of all classes of light horses would advance. Lighter W McKenzie, 2nd; A Phillips, 3rd. horses can be raised more cheaply, and are likely to command a higher price. It is to be regretted that horse breeding is not engaged in more extensively than it is. A horse can be lst; W Low, 2nd. raised as cheaply as a steer or a cow, and who does not know the difference Low, 2nd in price? Another advantage in horse breeding is that the army officers seldom ask for the pedigree of the horse; individual merit settles every point, Hardiness, freedom from disease, and suitable contour and action being the special requisites.
