The Mayoralty. There is already some talk about the probable candidates for the Mayoralty and several names have been mentioned. Mayor Feney has given no indication that he will retire, although that is assumed by a city paper. We see it announced that Mr. Fred Fisher will be nominated. If the Exhibition goes on we want a good man in the position of Mayor, one who is not afraid to take his coat off and work. Both the present incumbent and Mr. Fisher have had a lengthy turn in the office, and it may be the disposition of the citizens to give a new man a chance, believing that the office was not created to be monopolized. However, the FARMER has nothing to say against Mayor Feney. He gives a great deal of attention to his duties, and his administration, we believe, is generally satisfactory. In fact, the only objection that can be fairly urged against him, is that he has already held office for several years, and might fairly give way to somebody else.

The New Conservative Organ. The *Empire*, the new organ of the Conservative party in Canada, is to be issued at Toronto in a few days, and its appearance is anxiously looked for by both political parties. The general impression is, says a Toronto letter, that the *Empire* will be a success. The fact that Mr. John Livingston the first editor of the *St. John Sun*, is to have editorial control of the *Empire*, makes the new venture of special interest in New Brunswick. Mr. L. is an able, fearless writer, thoroughly conversant with every phase of Canadian politics, and better than that, he is familiar with every detail of newspaper work. The news editor under him is to be Mr. Kribbs, late of the *Toronto News*, and the business manager, Mr. Creighton, an Ontario M. P. The *Empire* office and rooms are in a new building on King street, west. The building is four stories, of gray brick, and is not far from the *Mail* office, occupying a place between that journal and the *Globe*, its position in location being somewhat suggestive of its position in politics, as presenting a solid conservative front against the cold indifference of the *Mail* on the one side, and the rooted and avowed hostility of the *Globe* on the other.

The Truro cariers had a game on Thursday. At Leonard Station, Madawaska County, on the 11th inst., Mrs. H. A. Ouilard, gave birth to her 18th child.

Fred B. Edgecombe is selling excursion tickets to California and intermediate places, at very low rates. After two years under prohibition, the city of Atlanta, Georgia, has returned to license by a majority of one thousand.

The mayor and eleven members of the city council of Lincoln, Neb., have been sent to jail for contempt of the United States circuit court.

Lord Mayor Sullivan of Dublin, has been sent to jail for publishing a report of the Land League's doings in his paper, the *Nation*.

Hon. J. D. McLeod and Wm. A. Dickson, two Picton lawyers have been admitted to the Ontario bar and have opened an office at Los Angeles.

The *Murretta Transcript* published at Murretta, Cal., is published by Horace McPhee and edited by Chas. W. Blanchard, both Truro boys.

Wallace Ross sailed from New York Saturday for London to row Bubar for \$1,000 a side and the *Sportmen* challenge cup of England in January.

Rev. R. M. Hunt, pastor of the St. Stephen Baptist church, has accepted the call recently tendered him by the Jamaica Plains Baptist church of Boston.

Rev. F. R. Murray, rector of St. Luke's Episcopal church, Halifax, has resigned and will seek a milder climate. His lungs were injured by fire and smoke during his heroic action at the poor house holocaust some years ago.

Dr. D. B. Myhrall, formerly of St. Stephen and Milltown, has abandoned the general practice of his profession and will hereafter devote himself to treating deafness and nasal catarrh. He has opened an office in Machias, Me.

Sir John Macdonald has selected Hugh McMahon as his successor in the Dominion Council to fill one of the vacancies on the bench in the common pleas division of the Ontario Supreme Court. He ran twice for parliament as a Grit, but is a very clever man.

Judge Tait of Montreal, has rendered judgment in the election petition filed against Aude, M. P. for Shefford, and Claves M. P. for Missisquoi, dismissing the petition in both cases on the ground that the trial on the petition had not been commenced within six months.

Friday afternoon at Quebec while two brothers named Desmarces, were at work in Rocherville they quarrelled about a trifling matter when one struck the other on the head with a shovel, inflicting a wound from which death resulted in a short time. The fratricide was arrested.

It is said that Hon. Frank Smith of Toronto has resigned his seat in the Dominion Cabinet because he disagreed with the Government on the appointment of Judge Mahon. Smith is an Irish Roman Catholic and his place will likely be filled by Mr. Curran, M. P. for Montreal Centre.

Fire Thursday morning broke out at C. F. Todd & Son's lumber yard, near the dam, Milltown, St. Stephen. Todd's two gangs and the planing mill are a total loss. Considerable lumber, including five loaded cars, was destroyed. Todd's loss is estimated at twelve to twenty thousand. The property is probably fairly well covered. The railroad's loss is about \$1,000. The origin of the fire is unknown.

The estate of Dr. Avery of Halifax, is worth about \$200,000. He leaves \$500 each to the poor, to St. Matthew's Presbyterian church and Dalhousie college. The rest is divided in sums of \$5,000 and under, among a wide circle of acquaintances. The wide distribution has given rise to a great deal of talk. He always posed as a great friend of Dalhousie and local charities, and there were great expectations that he would have bequeathed them something handsome.

John Holt, a woodchopper, near Nebraska city, last Saturday night stumbled over the form of a frightful looking creature. He described it as an ugly man form in face and body, but so frightfully deformed as to leave only a slight resemblance. The body as far as he could observe, was entirely naked and black and rough. The head bore a slight resemblance to that of a negro, the eyes almost protruding from their sockets, and fangs stood out from a horribly shaped mouth. In locomotion it used its hind legs, and was undoubtedly its arm, from the elbows to where the hands should have been, as forest. The creature escaped.

A terrible accident occurred at Stellarton, N. S., Monday, N. S., Monday, when a 100 exploded, killing W. Eastwood, trackmaster, of New Glasgow; D. Robinson, trackmaster, of Hopewell, and A. Fraser, machinist, Acadia Coal Co. George Murray was seriously injured. Conductor Grant Brakeham McLean and a man named Melanes were slightly injured. The new station house was badly wrecked. Fraser leaves a wife and nine children, Robinson a wife and six children, Eastwood a wife and four children. The engine was torn into smithereens and the damage caused by the accident will be \$20,000. It was pitched dead at the time of the explosion and this made matters far worse. Two bodies were found among the debris and the other on the platform. Fraser was horribly mutilated, his head cut off, his arms broken and he was almost unrecognizable. They must have met death instantaneously. It is probable that they never knew what happened to them. The shock of the explosion was felt at New Glasgow, Trenton and other places.

THE LATE GEORGE TORRENS.

A Short Sketch of the Deceased Gentleman's Career.

From the *San Francisco Political Record* of November 12th, we clip the following sketch of the late George Torrens, who as the FARMER's readers are already aware, was the brother of the late Mr. George Hatt, Henry Torrens and Mrs. Dunlap of this city, and a large portion of whose fortune comes to the relatives of this city. Accompanying the article was an excellent portrait of the deceased gentleman. The *Record* says:—"This aged and honored citizen of San Francisco, departed this life on Friday, Nov. 11th, at the residence of his nephew, in this city, at the good round age of sixty-nine. He came to California with Thomas H. Blythe, the deceased millionaire, in 1845. Together they sought our golden shores, and together won the battle of a most successful life. Blythe died childless and intestate, and left a legacy of litigation that will keep his memory fresh for a generation. Torrens was equally successful in his career. Of a large, generous and honorable mind, simple habits and rare practical judgment, fortune smiled on all his works. As a city contractor, he was so far from being a miser, that what was to be done so fully and so clearly that he won the confidence of all. This is why his name is here. It is our delight and our mission to keep watch and ward on all our public servants, to place the laurel wreath on the deserving poor and hang garlands of honor on their graves. George Torrens is not brilliant, but he is a man of a steady and conscientious power and a resolution for right that turned neither to the right hand or to the left for any man's persuasion or his gold."

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POINTED PARAGRAPHS.

An Australian cricket team is to visit England next season. MAUD S. CONDITION POWELL is a capital thing to mix in food for poultry. Over \$18,000,000 were paid out last month by the United States Government on account of pensions. The Maine Manufacturing Co., at Fairfield, have made for one item in their year's work fifty thousand sleds. The largest wheat crop India ever produced was 302,000,000 bushels. The crop of this year was only 288,000,000. The New York Times is about to add six more stories to the building it now occupies, making it an eleven-story building. A movement is on foot in Washington, U. S., to organize a militia company, mounted on bicycles, similar to companies in the German and French armies. Another consignment of N. W. ranch cattle arrived at Liverpool, Glasgow and Bristol last week. The condition and appearance of the cattle were good after their long journey. The amount of oleomargarine manufactured in New York and Brooklyn during this year, has been 2,450,000 pounds, a decrease of seventy-five per cent. compared with last year. There were exported from Montreal, from May 1 to September 30, \$1,723,901 worth of cheese, an amount exceeding the value of the cattle exports for the same time by more than a million dollars. The silk dress coat has reached Boston and makes a tremendous sensation among the dudes of the Hub. It is a Paris fashion, and is really a handsome garment, made of heavy, lustrous silk. Sawdust is now sent to market from the mills in the United States, where it has formerly lain waste, by being packed in bales in a machine like a cotton press that reduces its bulk much over one-half. Owing to the delay of the contractors, it is not likely that "D" School of Infantry at London will commence active operations before next spring. A few men will be enlisted to take charge of the new building. Ormonde, the Duke of Westminster's unbeaten colt, has started in sixteen races since his first appearance as a two year old, and has never been beaten. In three years he has won over \$1,424,000.
