

Reciprocity.

The following bill was introduced in the Lower House of Congress at Washington, by Representative Butterworth with a view to complete reciprocity of trade between the United States and Canada:—

Whereas, controversies have arisen and are now existing between the Government of the United States and the Government of the Dominion of Canada, growing out of the construction of treaties affecting fishing interests; and Whereas, by reason of the contiguity of

the two countries and the similarity of the interests and occupations of the people there-of, it is desired by the United States to remove all existing controversies, and all cause of controversy in the future, and to promote and encourage business and commercial intercourse between the people of both countries, and to promote harmony between the two Governments, and to enable the citizens of each to trade with the citizens of the other without restriction, and irrespective of boundaries, as fully and freely as though there was no boundary line between the two countries.

Now, therefore, be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled: Section 1. Whenever and as soon as the lovernment of the said Dominion of Canada shall by act of her Parliament permit all articles of trade and commerce of whatever name or nature, whether the product of the soil or the waters of the United States, or manufactured articles, live stock of all kinds and its products, mineral or coal, the products of the mines of the United States, to enter "That settles it," as the cook remarked the ports of the said Dominion of Canada then she put some egg shells in the coffee.
