

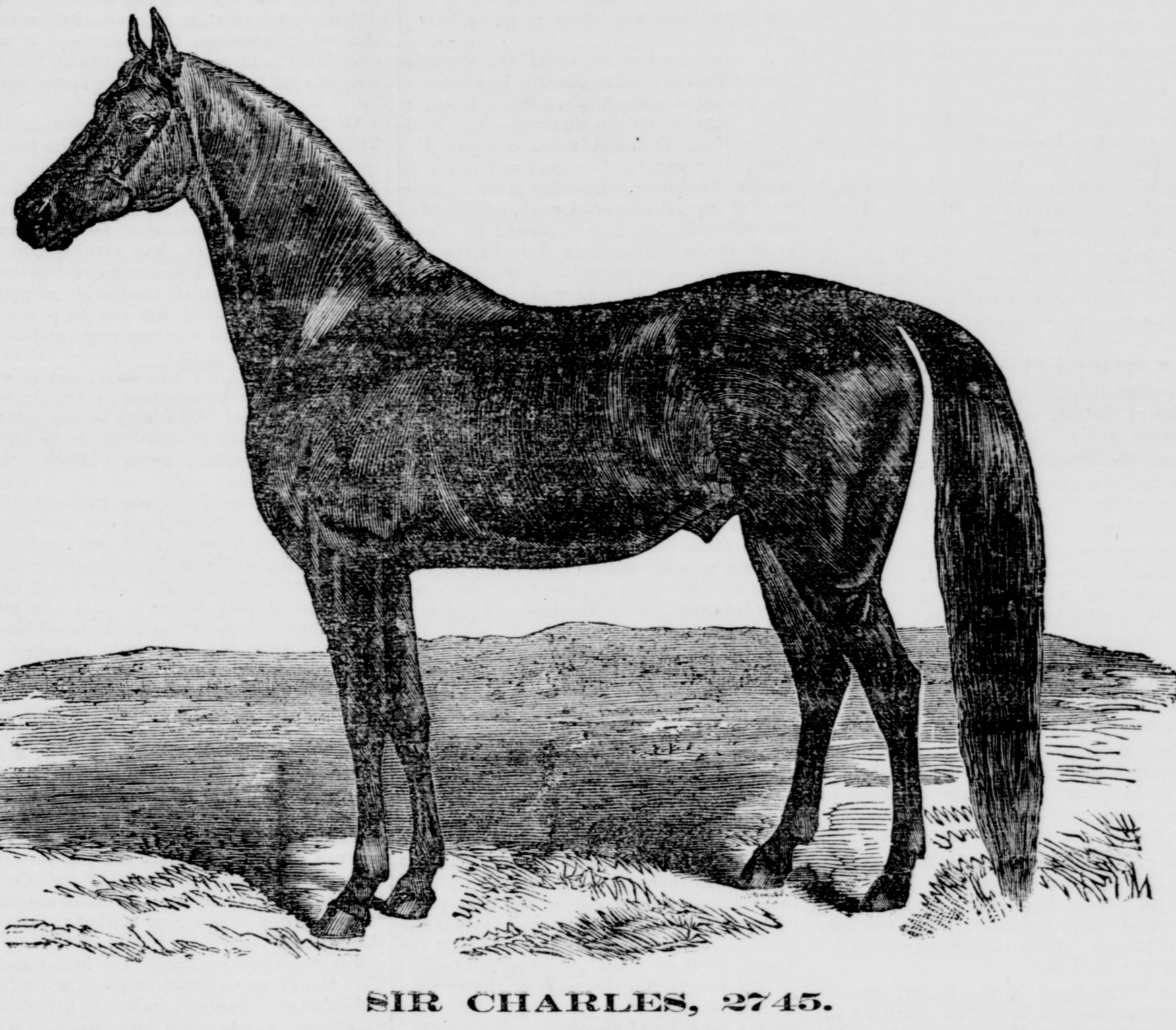

Farm Notes. It is best to milk rapidly so as to get the milk out of the stable as soon as possible, in order to prevent the absorption of gases by the milk, as the cooler it becomes the more readily the milk is affected by odors.

ALL SORTS. Cholera and all summer complaints are so quick in their action that the cold hand of death is upon the victims before they are aware of it.

Farm Notes. Diarrhea in calves is successfully treated by giving the whites of eggs beaten up with water into an emulsion, eight eggs being used to a pint of water, half a tablespoonful taken at a dose and repeated every two hours.

ALL SORTS. Joshua Wynagitt. The exports of wheat and flour from the United States during the month of April last were equal to 123,376,000 bushels of wheat, being at the rate of a little more than 2,740,000 bushels per week for the whole term.

Farm Notes. Weeds multiply very rapidly. The number of seeds each plant is capable of producing is estimated as follows: Dandelion, 12,000; shepherd's purse, 37,000; poppy, 15,000; common thistle 55,000; ragweed, 5,000; butter weed 5,000; purslane 385,000 and burdock 43,000.

Farm Notes. A peculiar disease made its appearance last spring among the lambs in upper Aroostook, causing the death of it estimated more than a thousand dollars, worth of the stock in that vicinity. The disease made its appearance after the lambs had arrived at from three to six weeks old. The first symptoms were a weakness in the limbs, followed by gradual and complete prostration. Several calves also died, apparently with the same disease. Its cause is a mystery and no one knows a remedy.

Each class has a mission to perform in the economy of nature, and without their assistance we will have neither crops nor fruit. The martins destroy weevil, the quails and grouse family destroy the chinch-bug, the woodpeckers dig the worms from the soil, the other out worms, bugs, and caterpillars. All do their part. Destroy the birds of prey but save your friends.

Farm Notes. The farmer of India uses a plow made of a piece of iron a foot in length, an inch wide and half an inch thick, which is sharpened at the lower end and fixed in a triangular piece of wood attached to the yoke on the necks of the bullocks by a rope of manilla grass. This plow tears up the ground like a harrow, and by harrow work can be made to go over nearly an acre of ground in a day. The operation of plowing is repeated five or six times before each sowing, or about ten times a year, as two crops are raised. After the last plowing the sowing follows after the machine and carefully drops the seed into the furrow.
