**Milk as a Carrier of Disease.**

A paper was recently read before the Royal Institution of Great Britain by Doctor Klein, which demonstrated with great clearness the fact that milk is one of the most effective media for conveying such diseases as diphtheria and scarlet fever. Not only did the doctor show from various medical reports that epidemics have been clearly traceable to dairies, the milk from which had been contaminated from human sources, as, for instance, where it was daily carried through a child where children recovered from scarlet fever were playing about, but that there are cases in which the disease must originate with the cows themselves and is communicated from one to another. Such, in fact, was scientifically shown to be in the case of cows. Cows were attacked by some disease of which the symptoms were those of the loss of hair, etc. Experiment proved that the scabs from such sores could by inoculation produce the same symptoms in previously sound animals. Experience showed that milk from certain cows thus affected produced scarlet fever in human beings. And conversely, that the micrococcus got from human patients afflicted with scarlet fever by inoculation produced the symptoms already mentioned as affecting the cows. Hence the conclusion is inevitable that the same micrococcus produces the same disease in both animals and men, and that the most watchful care is demanded on the part of dairymen and veterinary surgeons, to watch for symptoms of such disease in their cattle, and to keep the affected ones secluded from the rest, as well as to prevent their milk from going to market. It is comforting to know, however, that a thorough scalding is sufficient to kill the micrococcus and prevent contagion.

**The Tomato.**

The tomato has a curious history. Native of South America, like the potato, it is said to have been introduced into England as early as 1596. Many years elapsed before it was used as food, and the botanical name given to it was significant of the estimation in which it was held by our forefathers. It was called *Lycopersicon*—a compound term meaning wolf and peach, indicating that, notwithstanding its beauty, it was regarded as a sort of "Dead Sea fruit." The Italians first dared to use it freely, the French followed, and after eyeing it askance as a novelty for unknown years, John Bull ventured to taste, and, having survived, began to eat with increasing gusto. To our grandmothers in the United States, the ruby fruit was given as "love-apples," and adorning quaint old bedrooms, were devoured by dreamy eyes long before canning factories were within the ken of even a Yankee's vision. Now, tomatoes vie with the potato as a general article of food, and one can scarcely visit a quarter of the globe so remote but will find that the tomato can be seen there before him. Skill is required only in producing an early crop, and to secure this end the earlier the plants are started in spring the better. The tomato is very sensitive to frost, and should not be in the open ground before danger from it is over. In the foot, humid climate of England, the tomato is usually grown like the peach along sunny walls and, even in the most careful summer pruning as the grape-vine. By training the vines over various kinds of supports, they can be made as ornamental as they are useful. The ground on which they grow should be only moderately fertile, or else there is too great a growth of vine at the expense of fruit. This is especially true if we wish an early yield, and in this case the warmest, driest soil is necessary.

**How Dead Fowls are Sold in France.**

One of the most novel things in the way of marketing to be seen, is the disposal of portions of fowls. In Paris half fowls can be bought, but in Bordeaux the system is carried farther. In the central market, many of the peculiar carcasses hung up on the stalls—carcasses whose leading characteristic seemed to be the absence of meat. There were no legs, or wings, or breast; but it would be found on closer examination the stall contained the portions, offered for sale separately. Thus the Bordeaux house-keeper, able as most of the French are to make a fine dish with little meat, can buy a leg or a wing, or, on special occasion, breast, and need buy no more; and those who like bone-picking can buy the carcass. The blood is also sold in small dishes, and thus every portion is used. "Waste not, want not" being the motto there.

**Flower Garden and Lawn.**

To have a fine turf, the grass should be sufficiently vigorous to require mowing at least once a week. To mow often and leave the clippings, is better than to let grass get so large that it must be raked up and removed. Remove all perennial weeds by the roots. If ribbon or other ornamental beds are to be planted in the lawn, do it at once; simple designs are more easily kept in order than the elaborate. As soon as flowers fade, cut away the unsightly remains, unless seeds are wanted, when only the few that may be needed should be allowed to ripen.

**New York hop growers think the industry has seen its best days, in that State. **What Age should a Heifer Calf be?**

This question has been frequently asked and discussed on both sides of the Atlantic. Some advocates of early calving have advanced the theory that their method is favorable to the development of the milk secretory organs, and that thereby the flow of milk is increased. Actual experiments, however, tend to disprove this statement. In painstaking experiments conducted in Denmark in which heifers having calved when about two years old competed against some having first calved when nearly three, the three-year-olds gave the greater yearly average quantity of milk. 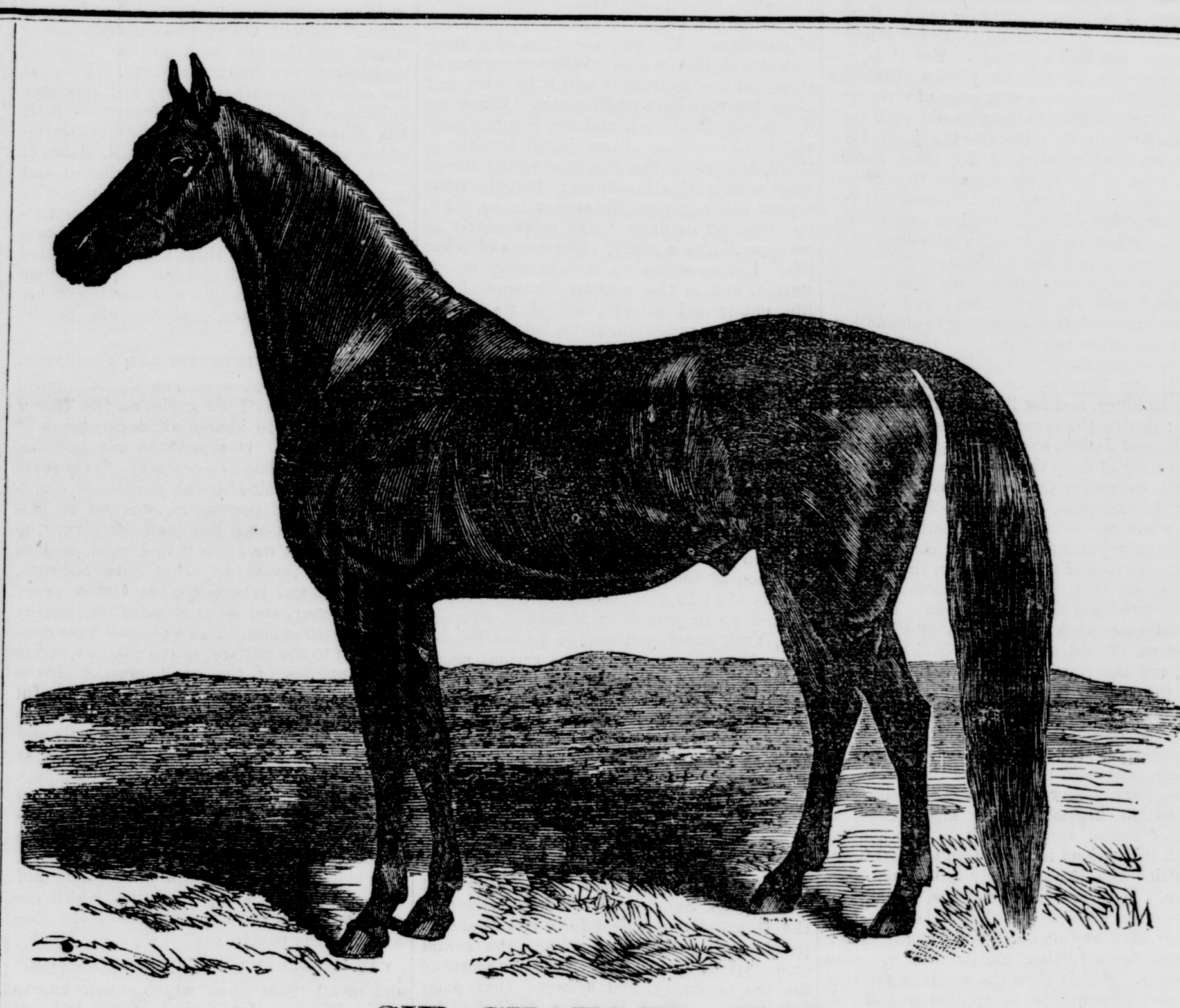

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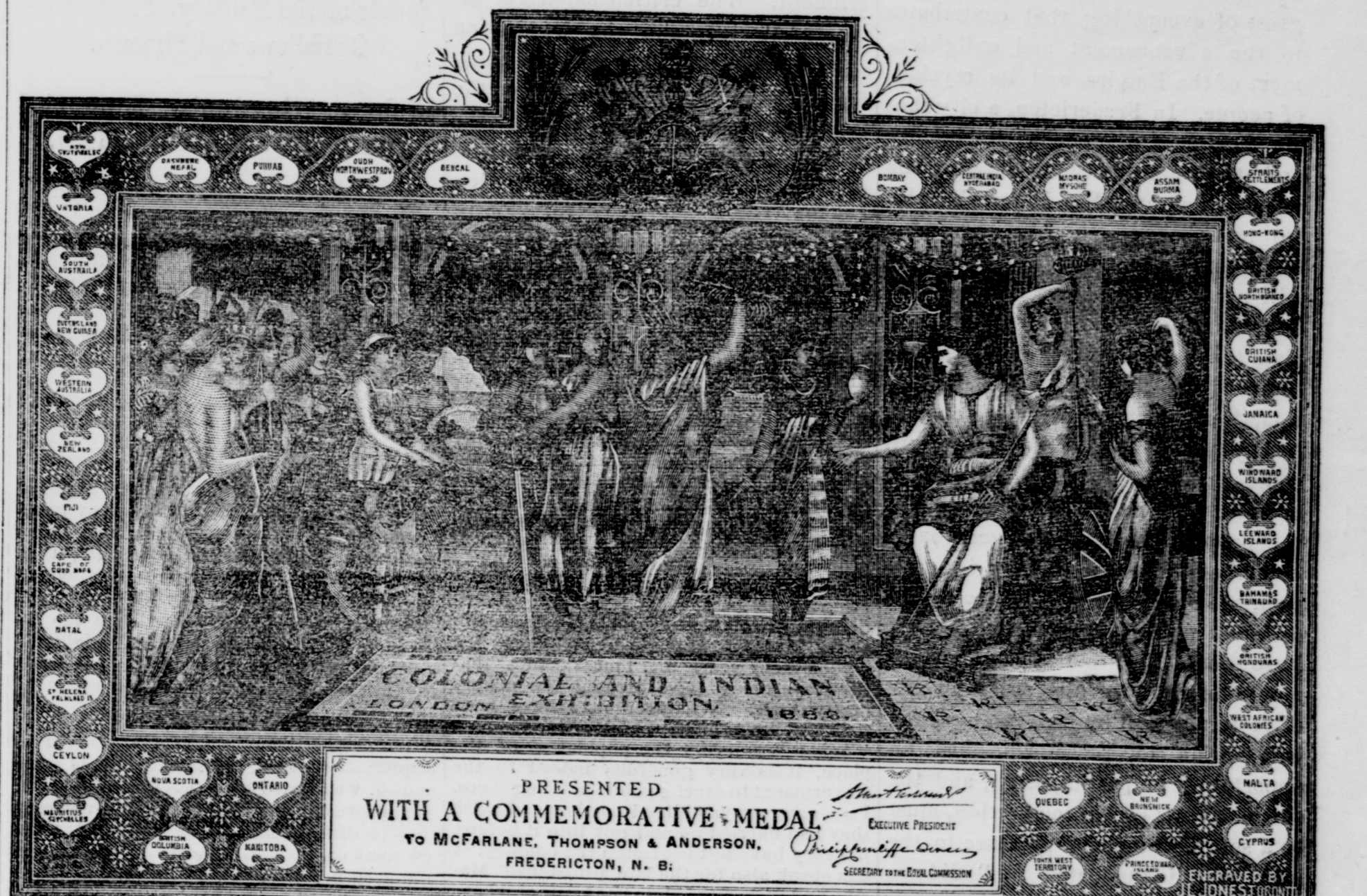

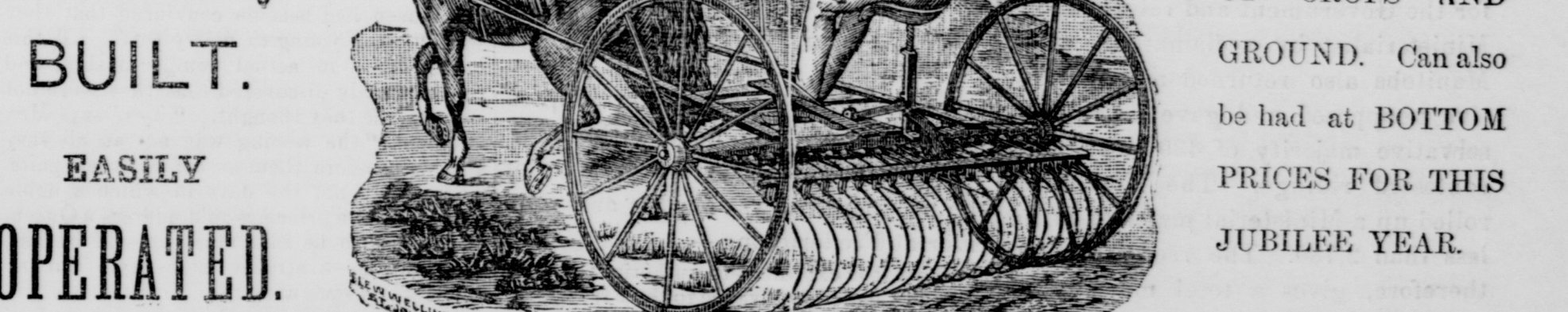
