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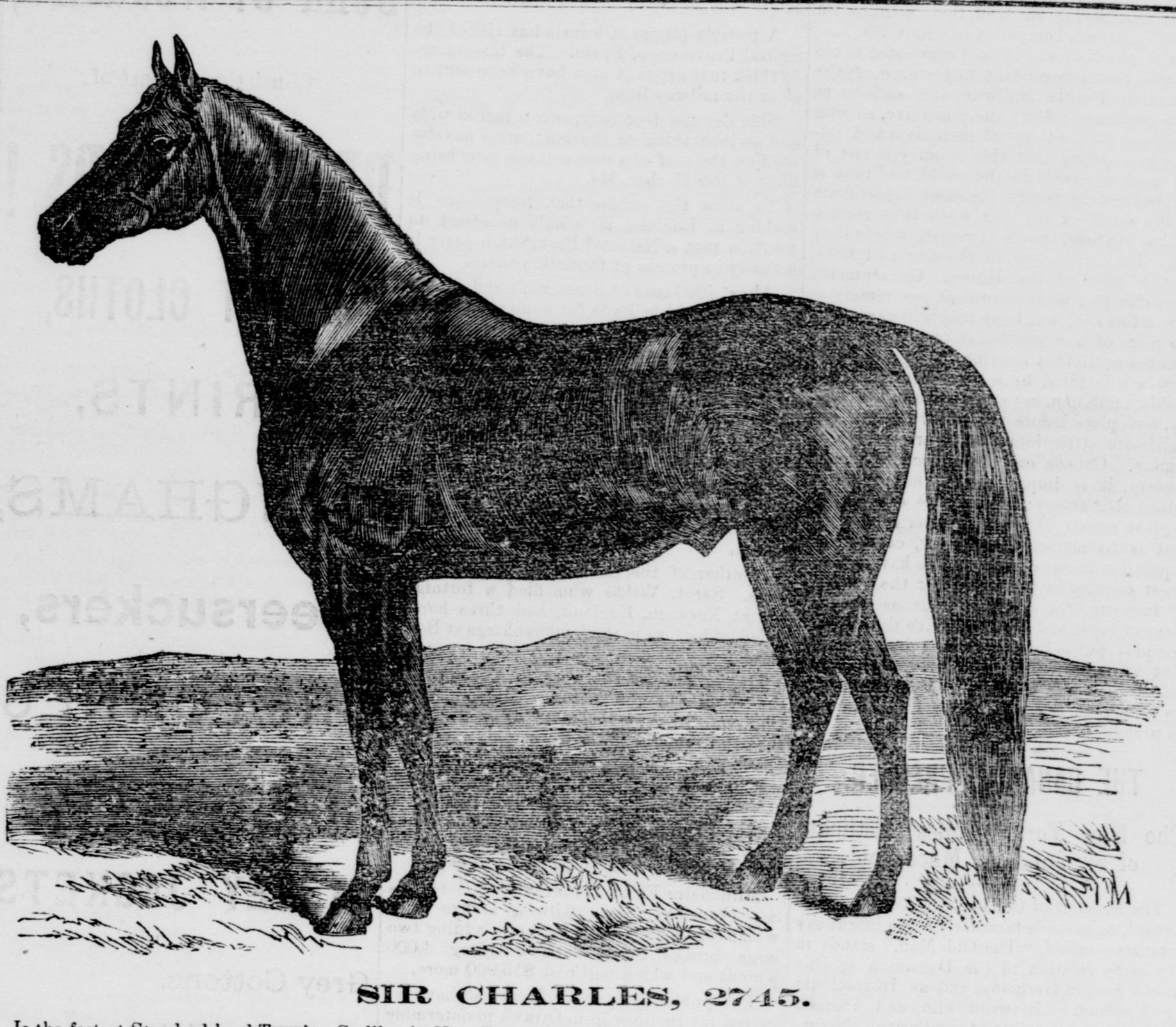

The Time to Cut Grass.

Two acres of timothy grass especially uniform in character and growth were divided into two plots of one acre each. One lot was cut in full bloom and the other was cut about 10 days later, when the grass was approaching ripeness. The grass was carefully cured and the hay weighed when stored in the barn. After being in the barn for five or six months, each lot of hay was re-weighed to determine the amount of "dry" hay from each cutting. The average increased yield of "dry" hay was 546 lbs per acre, where the grass was nearly ripe, over the yield of grass cut in bloom. The average shrinkage in weight of early cut hay was 26 per cent, and of the late cut 19 per cent. The average yield per acre in four experiments of two years each was 2955 lbs of early cut hay and 3501 lbs per acre of late cut hay. But chemical analysis showed that the increased weight of late cut hay was due to the growth of starch and woody fibre, as the nitrogen compounds, protein, the most valuable food element, has increased none or but very little. This is a strong argument in favor of early cut hay—that is, cut when in bloom. So true is it that the 2955 lbs of early cut hay were found to contain a little more actual food elements than the 3500 lbs of late cut hay. This was at an American Agricultural College.

### Applying Fertilizers.

It is a great mistake in the application of concentrated fertilizers such as the superphosphates, bone meal, ashes or any of the different agricultural chemicals, to drop them in a compact mass in the hill and near where the seed is planted. It should be remembered that the plants take their food from the soil through their roots, and that those roots are quickly sent out into the surrounding soil after the plant starts into growth. While it is conceded that the elements in the fertilizer are dissolved out by moisture, and diffused through the soil in a measure, yet it is certain that they do not travel far. The soil is a retainer, and does not pass the material along from particle to particle. It is plain, therefore, that the fertilizer should be scattered into the surrounding soil if we would have it reach the roots of the plants more readily. The soil is a mass of particles, and it is a mass in error of practice which should not be continued. If liberal portions are applied it is better that the larger part be spread broadcast. It matters little what the crop is, the entire soil will be filled with its roots, and there can be no danger but they will find the fertilizer.—Maine Farmer.

### Cabbage Insects.

Cut worms or larvae of several species of insects are often very troublesome when cabbage plants are first set out. They work at night, and cut through the stem of the plants at the surface of the ground. Prof. Riley has lured these creatures to their death, and it can be done every time. The method is to bait with poisoned leaves, laying them over the surface of the soil about ten or fifteen feet apart, covering the whole plot or field a few days before planting. The leaves to be employed are those of cabbage, turnip, lettuce or clover; a tablespoonful of Paris Green is mixed with a pail of water and kept well stirred. In these the leaves are dipped and then distributed over the ground.

### Why Don't Farmers keep Bees?

Bees ought to be as universally found on the farm as fowls, or any other domestic animals. Yet there are comparatively few farmers that have them and hundreds of pounds of the nectar of the flowers is lost every year on the majority of farms that might otherwise be used greatly to the comfort and health of the user. The farmer does not need to be a perfect apiculturist to succeed with bees on a small scale. If he invests in a good bee book and commences with a single stand, he may with no labor and little or no care be able to supply his family with often as needed with that most delightful and wholesome addition to any table. We do not recommend farmers to go into honey raising for profit but merely to supply their own wants. A half-dozen good colonies in improved hives will ordinarily supply all that is wanted for a large family. There are few people who do not like honey; it is good for children and in disease is good medicine. There is nothing we know of that can make such a large return on the farm for so small an outlay. Let every beehive farmer try it.

### A Manure Mine.

If you have no basement under the barn and have not dug out under the stable floor for a long time, just take up the floor and dig out the part of the manure which has been accumulating there in the soil for so many years. Spread it over a number of acres of plowed land for a crop this year, remembering not to put on too much to the acre and to thoroughly cultivate it in. Talk from three to four feet deep, under where the urine would soak, of the soil and hard pan or whatever it may be. There are millions of dollars' worth of this fertilizing property lying dormant which ought to be used this year. You will receive benefit for years to come by acting on this suggestion.

When the energies of a tree are devoted to growing wood it cannot be expected to do much good bearing fruit, and this is the great reason why many thirty young trees in the orchard are unfruitful. Such trees should have a large portion of their tops cut out, and it is more than likely that they will repay the trouble required with a plentiful crop of fruit.

Evictions in New York.

The following extract from the New York Standard will be found of interest: "The truth is that evictions in Ireland are nothing like as numerous and nothing like as heartless as they are in New York. 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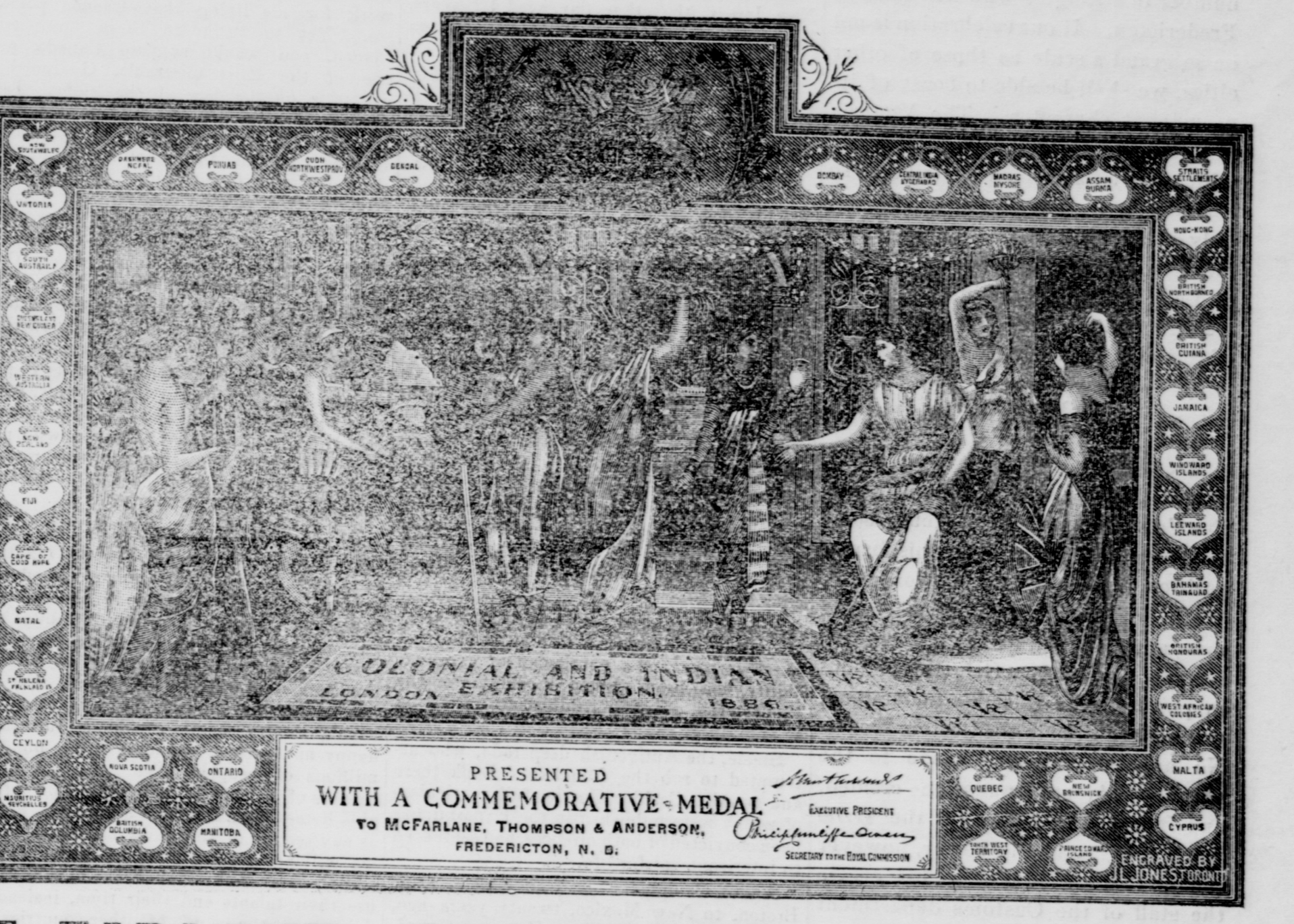
