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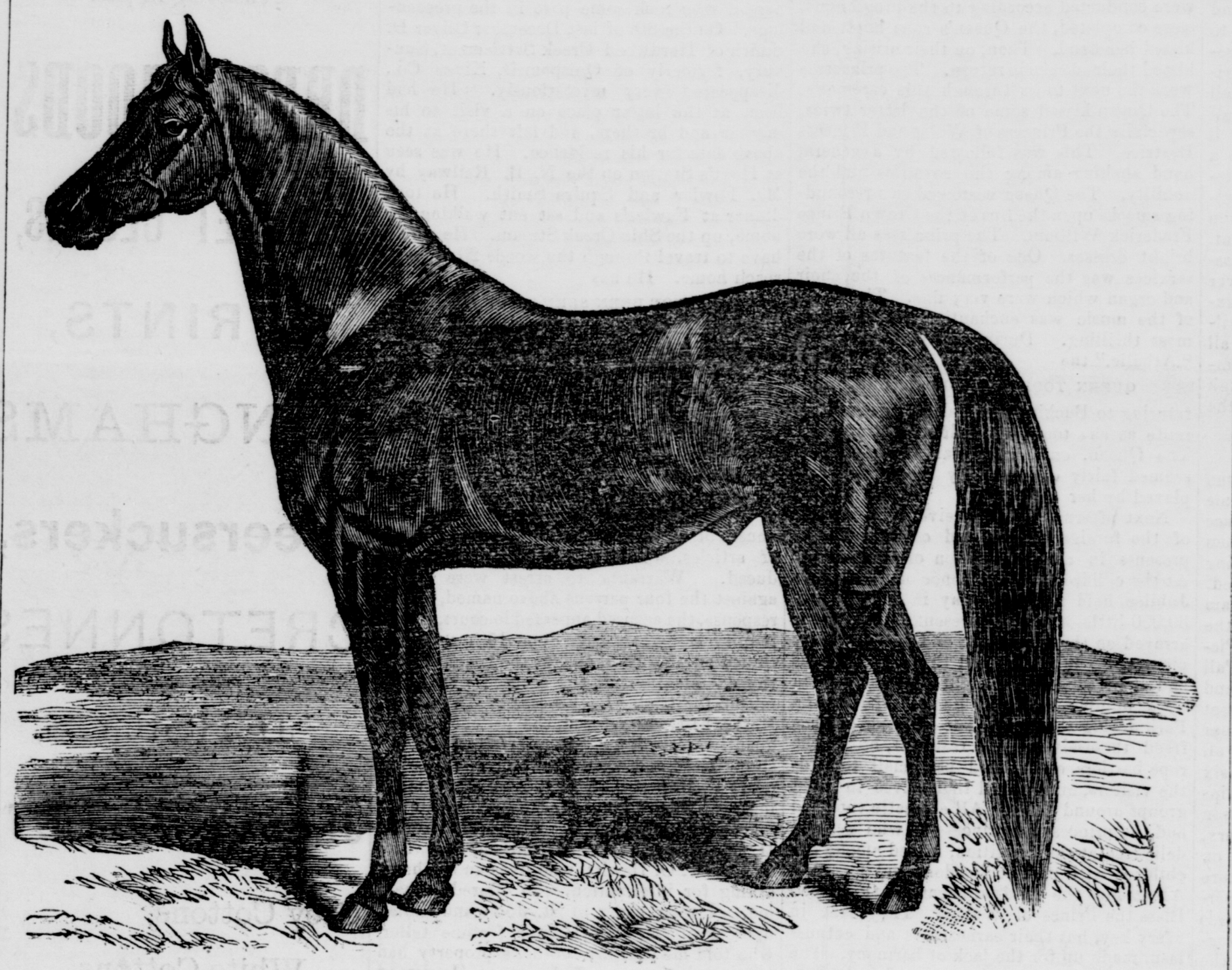

If you contemplate keeping bees as a regular business and wish to make it pay, we advise you to procure a good honey extractor, also a wax extractor; both are good implements in the apianary, saving much valuable time and will be the means of saving you honey in its purity and your wax from all undesirable combs in a condition fit for any market.

A calf should be weaned gradually. In the management of all kinds of live stock, sudden changes of feeding are to be avoided, especially with young animals. One can do anything with a calf, by gradual change of food.

When a calf has been fed with water, it is gradually added until only water is given, and solid food is substituted for the milk. The change may be begun when the calf is three months old, and may occupy a whole month. At this season there is nothing better than straw, but a little grain food will be well repaid.

A good story is told of a man who was so fond of strawberries that he adopted the annual custom of "following the strawberry season." He would find himself in New Orleans in February, all ready for delicious fruit to ripen, and would pass thence east to Florida. While the season in Florida was at its height he would pass up the coast, keeping just where the strawberries were ripest and best, and so he would go northward with the ripe strawberries, arriving in New England in June, passing through Maine in the early part of July, and closing the strawberry season a week or two later in New Brunswick.

Kindness, firmness, intelligence, these are the three prime factors in horse training to-day, and the man who neglects to exercise these is not to be trusted with the care of a colt. Acting on the principle that we are dealing with a creature that thinks and reasons, then the higher thought and reason of the trainer give him control, and all that is necessary is patience in showing the animal just what is wanted and how to do it. The horse never developed speed; it never made the horse safe to drive; but instead, by teaching it to trust the word of its master, it knows no fear; by showing it what was wanted, speed has resulted.

The question is often asked whether a confirmed balky horse can be cured. This admits of a double answer—yes and no. If the horse is in good hands, managed by some person who has firmness and judgment, he can sometimes be cured by driving a stake and hitching him at the spot where he goes wrong, until he is glad to move along to where his rations are. Horses have been cured by, as the saying is, "taking them at their word," and if they want to back, then keep them backing, giving the animal to understand that it is just what you want him to do. You can, in half an hour, to an hour, convince him that backing is a very much harder motion than going forward.

A correspondent of the Homestead gives a remedy for the onion maggot, which can be found abundantly about the homes of many farmers. Take green hickory leaves and stalks, run them through hay cutter, put them in a large kettle or tub, and wash them with an old axe or maul, adding water and pounding them to a pulp. Let it stand over night, have the decoction strong, and when you see the first sign of the maggot use this, and you will find it on all the onions as a preventive. Use a sprinker, taking off the nose, and pour the solution along the rows; it is seldom required the second time.
