

Steel War Horses

The German and French Governments some time ago introduced bicycles into their respective armies, and they have been used in the manœuvres with success. The first time the cycle was ever used by a British force was at the manœuvres of the British volunteer force at Dover this year. A few days before the review the matter was mooted, and 150 volunteers were divided into two divisions, and during two days they did difficult duty with surprising effectiveness. On one occasion a body of men entered a village and stopped to refresh themselves. They were surprised by a body of horse, but had time to lock their wheels across the road, and were able to successfully resist the enemy until relieved by a company of the "London Scottish." They were also used despatch carriers, and in one instance a cyclist was pursued for some distance by some mounted scouts and outpaced all but two of them. Finding that they were gaining on him he dismounted and hid himself in a covert and so escaped. By order of the Commander-inchief two cyclists were sent with despatches across a very difficult piece of broken country and made excellent time.
