England's Little Wars.

Without. counting Ireland, where British troops, in addition to the Royal Irish constabulary, are constantly at work evicting native populations, England is at the present time carrying on four campaigns in differents parts of her empire. Among the hills in the debatable land between the Punjab and Afghanistan an Afghan tribe is being punished for an attack upon British subjects. The wanton aggression of the Thibetans who, without cause, have invaded Sikkim, a native principality under the protection of the Indian Government, has compelled England to enter upon a war which may prove a most costly and hideous one. In Burmah the campaign for the subjugation of the people, which has now been steadily carried on with almost daily slaughter for over two years, is not yet within measureable distance of its termination. In Zululand the last struggles of the most vigorous of the native chiefs for indepence are now about over.

Great Britain has just taken her share of East Africa by annexing a slice from the seacoast to Lake Nyassa, North of Zanzibar, about as large as Pennsylvania, and with a population of some 2,000,000.
