A Summary of Foreign, Dominion, and Provincial Happenings.

Gathered from every Quarter. Shelburne election Oct. 15th. In Birmingham, England, physicians charge their patients according to the rental of the house.

The Quebec Province Medical Board has decided that ladies may be licensed to practice medicine in that Province. The crop of wild hops in Manitoba this season has been immense.

The race for the sculling championship of the world between Kemp and Haan, was rowed on the Parramatta River, Australia. The sculler Kemp, aged 38 years, was picked up Saturday morning by some section men between Grand River and Madawaska.

Building blocks made of concrete, form the object of an experiment at the University of Toronto. The concrete is made by machinery into forms similar to bricks and held together by wire.

As Forepaugh's show was unloading the show at Delaware Park, a horse named Elephant from Salem, N. J., was attacked by the elephant Tim, and killed.

Gathered from every Quarter. Amherst and Springfield, Cumberland's two adjoining towns are seeking incorporation. The 70th Regiment which arrived at Halifax last week were in garrison here from 1847 to 1857.

W. S. Saunders of Woodstock, has sold his Harry Wilkes colt, 4½ months old, to J. F. Cunningham of Antigonish, N. S., for \$200. Sir George Stephen announces his intention to build and endow a cottage hospital at a cost of \$5,000, in Dufron, Scotland, his native place.

John McCarthy publishes an indignant denial of Mr. Chamberlain's statement that the Irish have profited by the Nationalist agitation. An elastic hat has been invented. It will be a great thing for the man who has been out all night and finds in the morning that his head cannot accommodate itself to the ordinary hat.

Rev. Francois Roberts, cure of the parish of St. Theresa, Gloucester county, died very suddenly on the 23rd ult. He had been suffering for some time from an ailment, and a woman entered shortly after with some more bread, and a moment later fell to the floor.

Line-robique Tragedy.

PHILIPPINE AND TRAFALTON Convicted of Manslaughter.

In the Circuit Court at Andover, Victoria County, before Mr. Justice Wetmore, Philippine and Trafalton were tried for the murder of Mrs. Howes of Boston, on the Tobique River, Aug. 10th.

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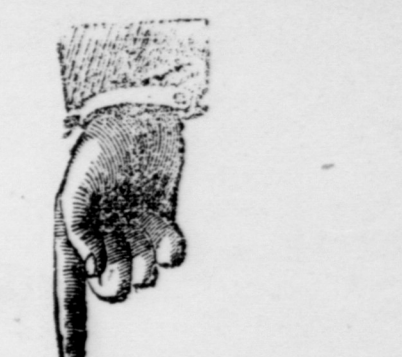
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
