York's Representative in the House of Commons.

A Successful Business Man and Politician

Who commenced life a poor Boy and Won wealth and position.

Mr. Thomas Temple, M. P. for York, of whom the above is an excellent representation, first saw the light of day in an English town in 1818, and came to New Brunswick with his father when but a boy, settling in the County of York. The future successfulbusiness man and politician had few educational advantages in his early days, and like many New Brunswickers who have hewn out their fortunes in the forest, when grown to manhood, went to the woods with his axe, and a determination to succeed in life. He has succeeded. The woodsman developed into an employer of labor himself, and gradually developed the foundation of the competence he now enjoys. For several years Mr. Temple was a partner with the late Mr. Pickard M. P., in the lumbering business; both prospered, and both realized a laudable ambition, a seat in Parliament.

Mr. Temple also engaged in railway enterrises. He built the Fredericton Branch Railway, and has been interested in others. He was appointed Sheriff of York County in 1864, and held the office for nineteen years, discharging its duties to the general satisfaction of the public. On the death of Mr. Pickard, Mr. Temple-was chosen the Conserthe House of Commons, and was elected on January 29th, 1884, defeating George F. Gregory by 168 votes. Mr. Temple was re-elected at the last general election in February 1887, again defeating George F. Gregory by a majority of 404.

Since Mr. Temple has had a seat in Parliament be had a ment, he has accomplished much in the in-

terests of his constituency. The Northern Western railway, and the Fredericton Railway Bridge, an excellent cut of which appears elsewhere are two great results of his efforts in behalf of this county, and by hiexertions, a Dominion subsidy has been voted for the F.edericton and Woodstock railway now in course of construction. Mr. Temple, although seventy years old, is still in the prime of manhood, and appears good for many more years of life.
