A Republican Triumph.

Our despatches published elsewhere indicate that Benjamin Harrison, the Republican candidate, has been elected President of the United States.

It would appear that Harrison has held all the States carried by Blaine in 1884, and wrested New York from the Democrats.

From a British-Canadian standpoint it is difficult to express either approbation or the opposite feeling over the result.

The paramount issue at the outset of the campaign, was that of the tariff. the Republicans standing squarely for protection as it exists under the present tariff, while the Democrats, with the Mills bill, sought to reduce the duties on raw materials and introduce what the Republicans alleged was the tho thin edge of the free trade prin-

However, as the campaign progressed, the protection issue was largely put aside, and claptrap and demagogism took the place of principle and argument. Cleveland, who up to a few months ago was regarded as level headed man, stooped to the lowest plane of the professional politician to secure a second term. His retaliation message to Congress was an electioneering kite that would have been worthy of Grit political methods in Canada, and this example of demagogism was promptly copied by the Republicans. The Murchison letter if it really originated with the Republi cans, was a mean and contemptible business. There are those, however, who believe that the whole thing was originated by the Democrats, that Cleveland might have an opportunity of proving his sympathy for the Anti-British party, by summarily ejecting the British representative from Washington. If it was a Democratic plot, the recoil has been most destructive to its planners. The Republicans if innocent in the preparation of the letter, cannot be held guiltless in its application. Even Blaine, who will shape the administration for the next four years, was not above using the Murchison letter in his campaign addresses. While we do not believe that this matter turned the scales to the extent of electing Harrison, there is no doubt that Cleveland's disgraceful conduct towards the British minister, estranged from his party the votes of British Americans, while his transparent attempt to capture the Irish vote by such means, miserably failed.

While we express pleasure at the defeat of such tactics as were practised by Cleveland, we have very grave doubts whether the advent of a Republican administration with Blaine as its controlling spirit, ought to be a source of congratulation to Canadians. Blaine has always had the reputation of holding extreme anti-British sentiments, but the belief is reasonable, that he has to a great extent forfeited the respect of even his own party, and so may be compelled to subordinate his own personal feelings to the dictates of cooler heads in his party.

Harrison, the President-elect, is an Indiana man, with a spotless personal and political record. His grandfather was elected President in 1840. and died in office. It is believed that his administration will be marked who will undoubtedly become Secre-



THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Annual Report of the Chief Engineer. A Slight Fire Record for the Past Year.

At the City Council meeting last night, Chief Engineer Lipsett of the Fire Department, submitted his report for the past year as follows :-

To His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton :-

GENTLEMEN .- Again it becomes my duty to submit to you the Annual Report of the Fire Department, and as will be observed, the loss of property during the past year has been very small in comparison with former years. I can account for it in no other way than that more precaution is taken by our citizens to guard against fire than formerly. Located as the Hose Stations are, and with an ever ready and plentiful water supply, it seems almost an impossibility now for a fire to do any great amount of damage, and I now feel, in common with the citizens, that if the Fire Department is kept up in a proper state of efficiency, that a fire will seldom, if ever, spread from the building where it originated, unless by some mismanagement on the part of the Department or accident to the Water

As you are well aware, the Department celebrated the 21st anniversary of Confederabringing together firemen from the State of Maine, Nova Scotia and different parts of the Province to take part in the processions and sports held. The celebration was in every way successful, and was also the means of bringing thousands of people to our city, who, as well as the visiting firemen, went away well pleased with what they saw and with their visit. It would be out of place if I did not, on behalf of the Fire Department, thank the Council, the different Insurance Societies, and those of our citizens who so kindly and cheerfully contributed to the carrying out o the programme of the day. 


