**ALBERT COUNTY.**  
W. P. Robinson says of the Parish of Elliot:—Hay fine, but very little got up. Weather was favorable and the quality of it was good.

**CARLETON COUNTY.**  
David Burt, Parish of Wilmet:—The weather has been favorable for hay and the quality is up to the average.

**KENT COUNTY.**  
O. J. LeBlanc, M. P. P., St. Mary:—Hay 60; early part of season favorable; but very little cut. Wheat good; oats and timothy fair.

**KINGS COUNTY.**  
J. E. Fairweather, lower half of Norton and upper half of Hampton, 10 by 3 miles. Hay 70 to 80. The season has not been favorable since August 1st.

**CHARLOTTE COUNTY.**  
Hon. James Mitchell, referring to the western part of Charlotte, says:—That the blight has not yet appeared, and if existing conditions continue a large crop is assured.

**MADAWASKA COUNTY.**  
P. O. Byram, St. Leonard's:—Hay 75 to 100 according to the quality of the meadow. Oats as usual; a little short of last year.

**NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY.**  
E. H. Thimbleton, M. P. P., central part of the Parish of Newcastle:—Hay about 90 per cent. of an average, quality is good.

**GLoucester COUNTY.**  
John Hornibrook, western part of New Brunswick:—Hay 100, the best for some years. The weather has not been generally bad.

**QUEENS COUNTY.**  
S. L. Peters, river section of Hamstead:—Up to the 4th of Sept. intervals hay 85 per cent. The weather has not been favorable.

**VICTORIA COUNTY.**  
J. McNeil, Perth:—Hay 75; quality average; roots poor; pasture good.

**WESTMORELAND COUNTY.**  
J. J. Evans, Shediac:—Hay 65; weather unfavorable, greatly below average; grain very poor.

**RESTIGOUCHE COUNTY.**  
W. Murray, M. P. P., Restigouche generally:—Hay 65 per cent of an average; quality good.

J. H. Morton, Salisbury and Havelock:—Hay 75; early part of season favorable.

James Barry, Emigrant Settlement:—Hay 80; quality inferior; season very unfavorable.

Alfred Raworth, Upper Cape and Shore Road:—Hay 100; quality about average.

G. A. Lounsbury, Upper Queensbury and Lower Southampton:—Hay 75 per cent. of an average; quality above average.

J. M. Lindsay, New Maryland:—Hay 95 per cent of an average; quality very fair.

John A. Campbell, Kingsclear:—Hay 75; quality better than average; season favorable.

John Wilmot, Lincoln Front:—Up to the 4th of Sept. intervals hay 85; first of the season favorable.

James A. Manzer, Arctook:—Hay 95; quality average; early part of season favorable.
