The Price of Bread.

The immediate cause of the high price of flour and the extra cent on the bread loaf says the Sun, is easily traced to one Hutchinson, a Chicago speculator, who bargained for large quantities of wheat to be delivered on a certain day, and then bought up all the available supply. The result was that when the dealers looked for grain to fill their contracts it could not be found. Before they could sell to Hutchinson they had to buy from him, and to pay him prices about a call from Knox church, Galt Ontario. fifty per cent. more than he paid them. 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
