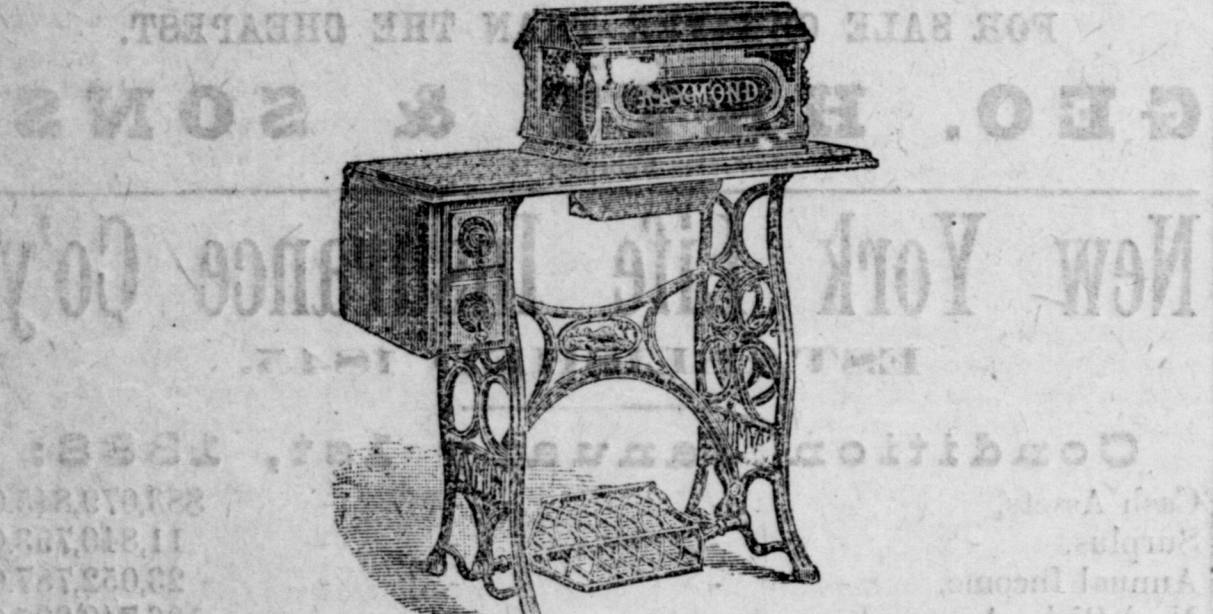

Nova Scotia Waking Up.

AND FOLLOWING NEW BRUNSWICK'S EXAMPLE IN THE MATTER OF HORSE BREEDING. The Committee on Agriculture in the Nova Scotia Legislature, presented their report to the House of Assembly last week, and made the following among other recommendations:

Care of Horses.

The National Stockman says to the farmers; "Don't starve your horses." The temptation to save a few cents by letting the team do without its dinner for a trip to town is made, is so great that many of our best farmers will practice this cruel custom without thinking of what they are doing.

Death to the Sparrow.

Since the general denunciation of the English sparrow by cultivators in nearly every State in the Union the department at Washington has taken hold of the matter, and it may be interesting to know officially, what these birds are doing, and what can be done. An appropriation was made last year by Congress of \$10,000 to that portion of the department which has charge of the birds and quadrupeds making depredation on crops, and the result is the thirty two pages of the large volume of the department report.
