The Liberal Leadership.

The return to Canada of Hon. Ma Blake has revived speculation as to the leadership of the Liberal party which ill-health compelled him to relinquish about a year and a half ago. The view taken within the party seems to be candidly stated by the Ottawa correspondent of a Liberal journal, who declares that with Mr. Blake in Canada and in Parliament, any other leader is impossible. Fancy, says the writer, Edward Blake, the giant of parliamentary debate and master of tactics and procedure, sitting quietly beside Mr. Laurier and allowing the Tories to have their own way in the heat of debate. Moreover, in the opinion of the correspondent the party will not accept Mr. Laurier while Mr. Blake is available, and it i hinted that if the latter will not resume his place at the head of his party some new man must be found for the post, for "Mr. Laurier, much admired as he is, is not that commanding figure in the public eye indispensable in leader."

The Toronto Empire doubts Mr. Blake's early resumption of the leadership of his party, and gives excellent reasons for its opinion. His health, there will be regret in knowing, is still precarious, and not sufficiently restored, from all accounts, to justify him in again subjecting it the strain and worry incident to the leadership. Besides, if his ambition for power remains, the time for resuming his place at the head of the Opposition is not opportune. Three years and more have yet to elapse before another appeal to the people is made, and in the interval the political situation may undergo important change, not so much perhaps in respect of the policies as of the personality of parties. To throw himself at once into the struggle and so practically usurp the place held on sufferance by Mr. Laurier, would be to risk committing himself to principles he may find it con venient two years hence to repudiate. If the condition of his health did not impose immunities from the labors and anxieties of party leadership, his own political interests would counsel Mr. Blake to remain in retirement until the eve of a general election, when with a great flourish of trumpets he can once more come from out the tent in which he has so often sulked. The inconsistencies of his political opinions would by this course be in a measure limited. He would not three years hence find himself compelled to retract the declarations he might find it convenient at the moment to make now.
