The New Governor General.

Lord Stanley, our new Governor General, is expected at Quebec to-day, and will be sworn in before Justice Fournier of the Supreme Court of Canada.

Lord Stanley was interviewed at Montreal, Ireland, Friday, where the steamer Sarmatian, on which he sailed, stopped for mails and passengers. Lord Stanley said that he had acquired in his experience in the Colonial office an accurate knowledge of Canada's vast resources.

He was greatly impressed with the possibilities of Canada's future. He didn't go, he said, with any preconceived ideas regarding government or policy, and did not wish to force any policy upon the country, which possessed a responsible Government.

Lord Stanley is an ardent Imperial Federationist, and for this he has already been attacked in Canada by Premier Mercier of Quebec, but it is not likely the new Governor General will attempt to force his views on the Canadian people on this or any other subject, and moreover, it is most unlikely that any effort of that sort would prove effective.

McMillan, one of the liquidators of the bank, and the deficiency of assets, was over \$1,300,000. The liquidators had realized nothing from Stewart or from Guy, Boyan & Co. From two of the latter they had received \$185,000, but the closed had got \$5,000, and a promise of a little more.

At Victoria, Canon, Carleton Co., Sunday afternoon, Wm. Thistle, aged 70 years, was found dead on the sofa. His wife and daughter had called in at a neighbor's for a few minutes leaving him in apparent good health. Heart disease was the cause of death.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the marriage of Sir Mayor Henry Graham of St. Stephen, was celebrated with a grand dinner on the evening of May 28th. Mrs. Graham is a Fredericton lady, daughter of Mr. Michael Colter. The Rev. J. B. Jones of Vancouver was guest of honor.
