an Old Residenter.

When people get old and are thereby rendered incapable of engaging in active occupation, their minds naturally turn backward to the early and stirring events of their life, They live over again many times the days when they were young, the days when they were the principal actors in many stirring were the principal actors in many stirring scenes. 


