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Todd's Stock Farm. (Written for the Farmer.)

A recent visit to Mr. Todd's stock farm, reveals the fact that he has gone into the breeding of light harness horses and trotters in earnest. Mr. Todd has invested in the vicinity of \$75,000 in this enterprise, and it is to be hoped that it may prove a financial success. The farm is situated at Oak Point, Charlotte County, on a point of land between Oak Bay and the St. Croix River, about six miles below St. Stephen.

In the month of February, the visitor could form no opinion of the fertility or condition of the farm, but residents of St. Stephen acquainted with the locality, pronounce it a fine grass farm. Arriving at St. Stephen about 3.30 P. M., on a fine February day, the excursionists from Fredericton were met at the depot by a number of horsemen, prominent residents of the town, among whom we noticed Mr. McMonagle, Mr. Henry F. Todd, Mr. Chas. Eaton, Mr. James Ganong, Mr. Fred. Murchie and others. These gentlemen had their teams at the station, and drove the party down to Oak Point. Arriving at Mr. Todd's farm, we found Mr. James Kehoe, the veteran driver, in charge of the stock. The barn occupied by the stallions and brood mares, is a large brick structure, with a row of roomy box stalls down either side, with a driveway 12 feet wide between. On entering the barn, to the right is the stairway leading to a spacious loft for hay. On the left, the office, fitted up very comfortably indeed, with a nice convenient desk and easy chairs. Adjoining the office is a commodious harness room, with a glass front case across one side of the room, for holding the harness. This room is sufficiently large to admit of a horse being led in, and it was here that the visitors inspected this valuable stock. The boxes and walls of the driveway are wholly sided with matched dressed wood, (birch and maple) and dressed with a coating of shellac, which gives the whole a tidy and attractive appearance. There are two windows in each box, one admitting the light from outside, and the other opening into the driveway. The latter springs on pivots half way up the shaft, so as to allow for free ventilation. There is nothing inside of any of the boxes, which a horse can get hold of to gnaw. In this barn are 18 boxes. Besides the brick barn, there are two large wooden barns, closely adjoining. The stock was shown by Mr. Kehoe in the following order:—

Ch. m. Adele Gould, 2.19, sired by Jay Gould and out of Emeline. This mare is in foal to Panscoot;

B. m., Augusta Schugler, 2.26, sired by Aberdeen and out of Emeline;

B. m. Kate Taylor, 2.23, full sister to Augusta Schugler. In foal to Red Wilkes;

B. m. Ray Gould, 2.29, full sister to Adele Gould;

B. m. Alice Blackwood, 2.29, by Blackwood, out of Emeline. In foal to Mambrino Russell;

Ch. m. Daisy Hartshorne, 2.24, full sister to Kate Taylor. In foal to Panscoot;

B. m. Carrie R., trial 2.25, full sister to Ray Gould;

B. m. Fortuna, by Jay Gould, out of a daughter of Clark Chief. In foal to Ramor;

Blk. Colt, Sired by Rampart, and out of the McCallan mare;

B. s. Edgardo, No. 4153, foaled 1885, sired by Ramor (3033), and out of Lucia by Jay Gould (197), grand dam, Lucy 2.18;

Blk. m. formerly owned by Hon. D. McLellan, known in Fredericton as the "Powder mare." This mare is the dam of the Rampart colt, above referred to, and she is now in foal to Edgardo;

B. s. Elation, by Electioneer and out of a daughter of Volunteer;

B. m. Lady Messenger, by Messenger Chief. In foal to Viking;

B. m. Said to be by Cuyler, with no record, but capable of trotting in 2.40.

B. filly by Wedgwood out of the last mentioned mare;

B. colts, by Charlie Wilkes, out of Lady Messenger.

Having but a short time at our disposal before sun down, the examination was necessarily superficial, but generally they are a very fine looking lot, and wonderfully smooth for mares that have obtained such records as they have.

Mr. Todd has purchased all the daughters of the great brood mare Emeline, and there are first-class mares come to the farm. Emeline is one of the greatest brood mares the world has ever seen. She is the dam of 8 if not 7 in the 2.30 list, and the most of them sired by different horses.

On examination of the pedigrees of the above stock, it will be observed that Mr. Todd has made a judicious selection.

Elation is a beautiful bay stallion, with particularly black points. He has a fine head, beautiful neck, good barrel and is very straight and clean in the legs. He stands 16 hands and will be four years old in June next. Mr. Kehoe is authority for saying that late last fall he saw Elation trot a quarter in 37 seconds, a pretty good clip for a three year old.

Mr. Todd also owns "Lumps," a Wilkes stallion, full described in another column.

This undertaking of Mr. Todd's is a new venture in New Brunswick, and we hope that he may be sufficiently successful to lead other capitalists to follow his good example. We believe that New Brunswick is well adapted to raising this class of horses, and they may not mature so early as in California and Kentucky, and we may not expect baby trotters, there is no reason why we should not do as well in Maine, which produces as good material, light harness horses, as any part of the continent. When the different tracks throughout the province, establishes colt stakes to be trotted for at their fall meetings, the interest in breeding good ones and having them developed early, will receive an impetus, and will induce the breeder to pay more attention to his stock and to his selections of parents.

With these horses of Mr. Todd's, the horses belonging to the Government, Sir Charles, Keenage and other good sires in New Brunswick, the aspirants for honors in colt races in the next few years should be numerous and good ones.

On behalf of the Fredericton excursionists, your correspondent would desire to thank the horsemen of St. Stephen for the uniform courtesy received.

In closing we would congratulate Mr. Todd on his selection of good ones, and express the hope that he may find his undertaking both pleasant and profitable.

A Celebrated Horse. The Spirit of the Hub, of Boston, of the 1st inst., devotes over two columns to a description, written by Edgar Payson, of the stallion Lumps, recently purchased by W. F. Todd, of St. Stephen. It says he is a seal brown horse, the hair soft and fine as silk, with a rare lustre, his weight 1,000 lbs, his height about 14.2, not a pony or dwarf, but a horse fully developed in every part and put together for power, endurance and speed. There is nothing waste or loose in his construction, nothing that need be taken away, and it is doubtful if the most exacting critic could successfully add anything to its formation. Lumps has proven his ability to trot fast and train on; to beget speed and size with beauty; and also to impart the great essential of a lively, pleasing disposition. Lumps' record is 2.21. He has frequently shown trials below 2.20 and once as low as 2.15. Indeed his driver, Frank Van Ness, says that Lumps has hauled him faster than he ever rode in his life, and this man, the trainer and driver of the great Harry Wilkes, 2.14. Lumps has gone a half in 1.04 in a race and at the finish showed every indication of his ability to make another half at the same rate. * * * Lumps was begotten in his dam's two year old form. She is now a fully grown and well matured mare. Snobs, the five year old son of Lumps, has a record of 2.30 and is a large horse of fine mould and weighs 1,000 pounds. Lumps has been campaigned until within five years and his colts are now young and untrained, but are very promising and are all of large size and stature. The breeding of Lumps combines most of the great characteristics of his sire, George Wilkes, being a son of the great Hambletonian 10.
