MAN-EATERS AT HOME.

The Cannibal People of New Zealand and the Fiji Islands. (Cor. Philadelphia Press.) I have known two cannibals intimately and they were both most agreeable men. One was my brother-in-law in New Zealand and the other my partner at whist in Fiji. The race is dying out a fast, and the opportunity of counting a cannibal among your acquaintances is growing so rare, that my impression of them may not be correct. The first I met was on the Northern Island of New Zealand in 1880, I met in the vicinity of the beautiful Bay of Islands, the old Maori chief, Te Hemera. At the time he was approaching 80 years of age, but his intellect was bright and his memory apparently unimpaired. In his younger days he must have been a man of magnificent physique. He well remembered the arrival of the first white men and how many and wonderful were the yarns he told about them. On the subject of cannibalism he spoke as an expert, having partaken of many a human being, and he said that the Maori never indulged in cannibalism except in the case of enemies killed or taken prisoner in battle. Prisoners, however, were often kept as slaves and eaten when on the occasion for some great feast occurring, taken and killed. Rarely, except after a big battle, or the wreck of some ship on their rocky coast, did the Maori indulge in a human banquet. PREPARING THE HORRIBLE BANQUET. The feast was conducted with considerable ceremony in a "pa" specially reserved for the purpose and which went by the name of "Kai Tangata," which means "eat man." The method of cooking was as follows: The body was hung up to a beam by the neck, sealed with boiling water and carefully scalded with oyster shells. It was then taken down, the hair all cut off, and the head despatched. The brain, being considered a great delicacy, was reserved for the chief. In the case of men killed in battle the head was reserved for the chief. The entrails were then taken out and the trunk cut up into bits. It was then placed in an oven built in the ground, covered over with stones and allowed to cook for at least twelve hours. The body was then taken out and the head and neck removed and the whole right during which the cooking was going on was passed in feasting and dancing. At early dawn the body was cut up and put for distribution. Some of the first was given to the women, and each man, on receiving his share, "ate to his 'pa'" and ate it in private. Te Hemera could give me no recipe for the best custom, as it is a very curious one, as at all other banquets the food is eaten public. I fancy it must have originated from the fact that their inordinate love of human flesh led them to lead to quarrels during the consumption of it. Should this be the solution of the custom it may be taken as a confirmation of the theory that the practice of cannibalism tends to begetherness and to induce a love of howling and howling the taste becomes to the human mind that on one occasion a young girl was allotted to him as his portion and he was obliged to eat it. He was put in a cage he carried her far from the settlement into the bush and there remained until he had finished her. Can anything more ghastly be imagined than this? The worst of it was that he was a New Zealand forest? I confess that after hearing this I felt a loathing for the old man which I never got over, and I was not sorry to leave him. FARM NOTES.

A New Type of Horse. Hereditary Unsoundness. The Chicago Western Rural says: "Senator Palmer of Michigan, it is said, is about to try the experiment of breeding pure Arabian horses with Percherons, hoping thereby to raise in this country a breed of horses superior to anything we now have. The superintendent of Senator Palmer's farm has arrived at LePerche, in France, the home of the celebrated Percheron horse. He will start thirty or forty Percheron stallions and mares. He will then proceed to Damascus, where he will purchase five full blooded Arabian horses and return with them to France and the United States. Senator Palmer has an idea that by long intelligent in-breeding a new type of horse may be created, or the best quality of the old type reinforced by the crossing of the Arab horse with the Percheron mare, and vice versa. If his experiments warrant it he will continue this in-breeding. All the thoroughbred horses in Arabia are owned by the celebrated citizens. This is the reason that the coarse, inferior breeds are never reared. The celebrated Arab horses had their origin in the district of Neid, the very place where they are to be found today. Capture in war, gift or legacy are the only recognized modes of transfer of these horses. Hence the commercial export of Arab horses has never been established. All works that have been written about Arabia and the celebrated horses, say that he is a deceiver who ever boasted of having purchased a horse there. A few, the Arabians admit, have been carried across the frontier by war victors, and a few given as presents to distinguished people. The Senator has given a great amount of study to the subject of breeding thoroughbreds. His agent has detailed instructions, and hopes to bring into this country for breeding purposes, some of the finest Arabian horses existing."

Carelessness with Cattle.

How many stock-raisers are there who cannot recall at the end of each year where they have met with more or less loss, that can be traced to carelessness on their part? It would surprise many a man if he would make a careful estimate of such cases, to see what he might have saved by proper attention and the use of good judgment. There is a large sum wasted in this way that is to be charged directly to neglect. A cow is soon to calve, and instead of providing comfortable quarters for her, where she can be watched and assistance rendered if necessary, she is left to calve in the field perhaps, surrounded by other cattle, or in a yard where the calf is liable to injury by getting into some mud hole. The calf may be weak and require some special attention at the start, in order to save it; the cow may not clean properly, or may require the best of care to prevent milk fever. Neglect under such circumstances results in the loss of either cow or calf, or perhaps both, while due attention would prevent it. Perhaps the fences are not kept in repair and the cattle get into the grain fields, not only damaging the crop but gorging themselves, with the result that some of them die. A little time and watchfulness would have prevented this. The same may be said of many injuries the cattle receive during the year; they might have been easily prevented by the attention which every man should give if he expects to be successful.

Impure Drinking Water.

It is surprising that epidemics are not more frequent when we consider how little care is generally taken to prevent the contamination of drinking water. In country places it is seldom possible or convenient to get a proper analysis, and we give before a couple of simple tests by which it may be discovered whether water is fit for domestic use or not: "Fill a clean pint bottle three-fourths full with the water to be tested, and in this dissolve half a teaspoonful of the purest sugar; cork the bottle and set it in a warm place for two days. If in twenty-four or forty-eight hours the water becomes cloudy or milky, it is unfit for use. If it remains perfectly clear, it is probably safe to use." Among other methods the following is worthy of trial: "Fill the bottle with the water to be tested, and shake up for a few hours in a warm place; shake up the water, remove the cork, and critically smell the air contained in the bottle. If it has any smell, particularly if the odor is repulsive, the water should not be used for domestic purposes. By heating the water an odor is evolved that would not otherwise appear.

Every horse should be taught to make a dead stop at the word of command. "Whoa!" It can easily be done, but it must be by careful handling and through discipline. A horse, like a man, is just "a bundle of nerves." If he is treated to be prompt in obeying the word of command, he will do so. If permitted to be inattentive, careless and slipshod these habits will become second nature to him. "Whoa!" is the word that should always be spoken in a tone of authority—sharp and quick—and no horse should be allowed to disregard it, or to take a single step after it has been spoken. Some men make fools of their horses and of themselves by issuing their orders in a dead-alive way, repeating them over and over, and neglecting instant enforcement. The horse learns to be careless and regardless. They cannot be blamed, for they do just as they have been trained to do.

Richer Manure.

Under the most favorable condition a considerable part of the feed is undigested, and is found in the manure. The great differences in the character of the manure of different classes of animals is obvious to all, and farmers speak of the different kinds as varying in strength (richness), according to the animals from which they come. Few ideas are more fallacious. The value (strength of richness) of manure depends upon the character of the food upon which the animal lives. The manure of pigs is ordinarily richer. Because the corn feed of pigs is much more nutritious. It is exactly so with all other animal manures. Their value depends upon the food, and as scarcely two kinds of food are of the same digestibility, and produce manure of equal value, it becomes an important matter to study their character as affecting the value of the manure of animals fed upon them.

Bull against Alligator.

A Kissimmee, Fla., correspondent sends the following to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat:—A very exciting and sanguinary contest between a bull and an alligator and several head of cattle occurred a few miles below on the banks of Lake Tohopekaliga, in which the alligator was killed and two bulls so badly injured that they had to be shot, and another was rendered almost hors de combat.
