

THE NEWS FROM STANLEY. School Examination and Church Donation.

A very successful examination of the pupils of Stanley school was held at the close of the term. Much creeit is due both to teacher term. All present went away at a late hour highly delighted. For five years Miss Sanson has had the charge of the Stanley school, and, what is rare, gave universal satisfaction to her patrons, and was much beloved by all her pupils. The evening's proceedings were brought to a close, by one of her largest pupils stepping forward and reading an appropriate address, and another presenting on behalf of their companions, one of Mr. McMurray's best writing desks filled with all the necessary accompaniments.
