The Railway Subsidies.

The Local Government carried their railway resolutions through the Assembly early Friday morning with decisive majority. The Attorney General took the position that all the lines proposed to be subsidized were named in the general subsidy act passed in 1882, and that because these companies did not come forward as promptly as others, was no reason why they should be debarred now from participating in the subsidy. He believed the act of 1882 gave the Government authority to grant the subsidies to these lines without the permission of the Legislature, but it had been the course hitherto to ask the leave of the House, and hence his resolutions.

Mr. Hanington wanted everybody to have a fair show. His doctrine seemed to be, "York, St. John, Madawaska and Kings are to receive subsidies as a result of the passage of these resolutions, that's all right, but you must let the rest of us in to." wanted a general subsidy bill, and so did some of the other speakers, but others again aimed their shafts at the Attorney General because they believedihe was doing too much for his own county.
