New Brunswick Crops.

Secretary Lugin's June Bulletin.

An Exhaustive Review of every County.

OFFICE FOR AGRICULTURE, Fredericton, 20th June, 1888.

Taking the province as a whole, the live winter wheat has been favorable to the stock. There was an abundance of food and the winter was not unusually severe. It is evident, however, that farmers have not as yet appreciated, as fully as its importance demands, the necessity of exercising the greatest amount of care in housing and feeding stock. Many of our correspondents have spoken strongly upon this point; but I have deemed it best to summarize their observations in the statement just made.

ALBERT COUNTY.

W. P. Robinson, referring to the Parish of Elgin, says:—

The spring was too dry and cold, and not so great an area has been put in crop. The prospects for hay are poor, as much of the winter killed; but there is more old hay on hand than we have ever known. The prospect is favorable for crops, although a good deal of what has been planted is not yet up. Stock wintered well.

C. J. Bennett, speaking of Rosedale and vicinity, says:—

The spring was cold and dry. Farming operations did not get very far. For want of rain to settle the land and take out the frost. After the land was ready for work it was fine weather, and farmers have planted in their crops. There is an increase in the acreage of wheat, but the crop look well except hay, which is very poor at present, but there is considerable old hay on hand.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY.

H. E. Hill, speaking of the western part of Charlotte County, says:—

The spring opened late, but has been very favorable otherwise. The acreage in crop is about the same as last year, with an increase probably in barley and wheat. Owing to the lateness of the season as large an area of potatoes was planted with less success than in previous years. The weather continues favorable and will have a very large crop. There is a large quantity of old hay on hand. Stock wintered better than usual.

KENT COUNTY.

Rev. F. X. Jos. Michaud, writing of Buctouche Parish, says:—

The season is late, but not a day has been lost for working. The acreage in crop is about the same, but is a large increase in the broad plant in the Montserrat and Buctouche Railways. The prospects of the hay crop are very good and there is more old hay on hand than in many years. Crop prospects generally are good. The winter crop is increasing every year to the great benefit of farmers; the oyster shells or mussel mud, which farmers haul every winter, proves to be a great fertilizer. The weather is very backward on account of cold springs, but about one third as much of the winter crop was sown as last year. The lack of ploughing, the weather being dry and the scarcity of help to plant the crop. The prospect of hay is poor, if we do not have rain soon, but there is an amount of old hay on hand. The winter crop is up except wheat which promises well. Stock wintered better for the last ten years on account of the abundance of feed.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY.

D. G. Smith speaking of the Parishes of Chatham, Glenelg, and the lower part of Newcastle, says:—

The spring has been fair for farming on light land, but in clay districts, such as Napan. Seeding generally is later than usual. The acreage in crop is a large as usual, if not larger. There is an increase in the acreage of potatoes. The prospects for hay are promising, the season having been favorable. Of old hay there is more than usual in the county, at a distance from the towns, but there is not so much in Chatham and Newcastle. I consider that crops have had a good start. Stock wintered well.

SUNBURY COUNTY.

Thomas L. Alexander, giving the following report as to the Parish of Gladstone:—

The season was rather late, the early part has been backward, but the latter part has been very favorable. More potatoes than usual have been planted. There being no note on the ground and the temperature varying at times between 15° and 20° below the zero, caused the frost to penetrate very deeply. The prospect of the season has been favorable. The acreage in crop is about the same as last year, except oats, barley and potatoes, in which there is an increase. What did not fill well last year and this with the change of season, is caused less to be sown. Crop prospects are fair, but it is early to speak definitely. Hay looks very well. We had a copious rain Saturday, (June 16th) which has brought the grass, there is a good deal of old hay on hand.
