A Conservative Choice.

The Conservatives of Colchester, Nova Scotia, met in convention Friday, and unanimously selected ex-Governor Sir Adams Archibald as their candidate for the vacancy in the House of Commons, caused by the appointment of Hon. A. W. McLelan to the Governorship. Sir Adams is an old man-he has passed seventy-four -but he is yet hale and vigorous both in mind and body. He is the most distinguished of Colchester's sons, and while he has already seen long public service, he has not passed the stage of active sympathy and participation in the affairs of the country. He was born at Truro in 1814, was educated to the law, acquired an immense practice in his profession, and entered politics in 1851, when he was elected to the Nova Scotia Assembly in which he occupied a seat until the union in 1867. He was Solicitor-General in the Nova Scotia Government from 1856 to 1857, and Attorney General from 1860 to 1863. He was sworn in Secretary of State in the first Dominion Cabinet in 1867, but failing to secure his election in Colchester, having been defeated on the question of confederation by the present Governor McLelan, he resigned his seat in the Government.
