





Give the Colts Exercise.

One of the mistakes made by breed ers of horses is keeping the colts confined in stables and in stable yards in winter. They may be ever so well fed, but food is not enough to develop colts. They need abundant exercise and if they have the run of the fields and are well fed they will play and take a great deal of exercise. This play develops not only muscle and bone, but lungs and heart, and gives tone and strength and growth to the body.
