An interesting meeting was held in the Temperance Hall, Gagetwn, on the evening of the 27th ult., to consider the advisability of establishing a butter factory in that place. Mr. J. at an early date. Mr. W. W. Hubbard of Sunbury County, was then called on. He said he felt a great deal of delicacy in speaking to Queen's County farmers on the subject of butter-making, from the fact that Queen's was always considered the banner county in the production of first class dairy produce. He urged that perfection was not yet reached, and advantage must be taken of all improved methods to keep the dairy industry abreast of the times. He then read a short paper dealing with the importance of keeping the skimmed milk on the farm, showing from the composition of milk, how particularly it was adapted to the formation of flesh and bone in the young animal, and also what a loss from a manurial point of view the farm sustained in having all the milk taken therefrom, as in the systems of cheese making and city dairying. Mr. Hubbard also endorsed all that the previous speaker had urged in favor of the creamery system, and emphatically stated that the mode of butter-making which produced the largest quantity of the best uniform excellence, with the least trouble and which would be in general use in the near future, and he claimed that the creamery or co-operative plan was the only one that fill a little of which cured me, leaving me as well as ever I was."—Henry W.
