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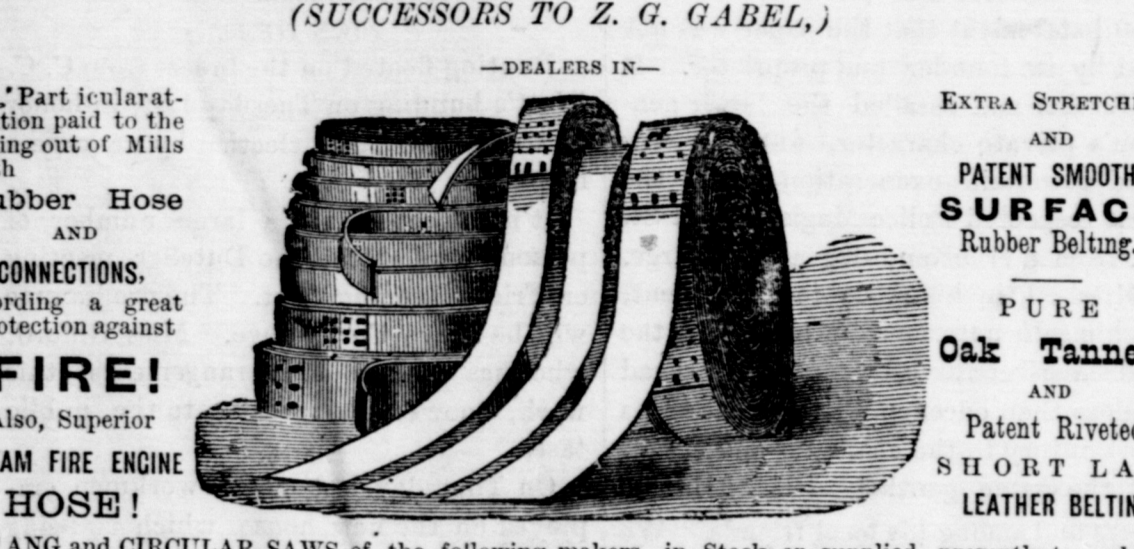

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ought, at least, not to cast it up to us now, in the first transports of his own conversion, when those "pangs" do not trouble him and when, perhaps, has an opportunity to secure from men with whom (according to his letter of 1875) nobody that has the slightest regard for the honor of the country will combine "what he failed--even aided by our letter--to obtain from those terrible "Grits." In the words of the Pilot man, as reproduced by the Advocate, we ask in reference to such men:

"Can they expect that, such, will be their passport, their credentials to enter the ranks as Volunteers in the Liberal-Conservative Army? Those newspaper Editors who would now swing Mackenzie like Mahomet, between the Heavens and the Earth! They must eat ashes a little while longer in Sackcloth!"

We hope some of our good friends in St. Andrews will suggest to "Junia" the propriety of appearing less excited and strange in his new attitude. When he used to hang about the lobbies at Ottawa, yawning Messrs. Burpee, Smith, Anglin, Gilmore and other members and supporters of "McKenzie," for the purpose of urging his claims to the office of "paper folder," "paper arranger," or something of that sort, he was a good deal more humble and moderate. He did not use so many capitals in his writings, while he also got someone to make his petitions grammatically correct, and did not dare to spell the Premier's name wrong, a la Gladstone and one of our friends who writes for the Sun: "Time doesn't now, again become a good, humble old gentleman and cease to blame us for the errors which he was one of the first to lead us into, we will be obliged to fish some of his MSS. from our waste basket to further show how he has been misled by those 'newspaper trumpeters who sounded aloud "the bugle notes of adulation and wrote in "this behalf," etc.

Referring to Mr. Snowball's defence against the Mitchell Petition in which Messrs. Sadler, Crocker, Whitney and Call have been put forward to do the prosecuting, the Telegraph says--

"So it seems the law courts must decide the question, and then there may, or may not be another election contest. Our idea is that it would be better for the parties in this and in other similar cases to accept the situation and to avoid, if possible, to do better next time. The times are not favorable to costly litigation. To any new election contests that can be well avoided."

The contested election cases connected with the choice of the new Parliament are not likely to prove as numerous as we expected. We read of a few only turning up in Ontario, still fewer in Quebec, one in Manitoba, and rumors of one or two in Nova Scotia. In this Province there is to be a two-handed contest in Northumberland. Mr. Mitchell's friends will try to get Mr. Snowball upset and disqualified. A counter attack is to be made by Mr. Snowball against Mr. Mitchell and his agents. Some talk has been floating round of other cases. We are sorry that even one case has arisen in New Brunswick. Our people do not like to see the protracted and costly election squabbles. When they fight their way through a general election, however it may result, they like to have done with the business till necessity requires them to take the field again. In Ontario public taste runs in another direction. The Ontarians, generally speaking, are a fine high-spirited people. But they have a keen relish for election excitement. They get it up early; work it up to the boiling point; go into the arena in an ardent spirit; and when the nuts and the wine, they lengthen out their election enjoyment by renewing the struggle in the Courts. Why, there is a case on hand in an Ontario County which has lasted for years. The New Brunswick people generally do not relish this sort of thing. Small blame to them for that, for these contests are rarely necessary, and still more rarely beneficial in result to public interest. They unduly lengthen out an unwholesome excitement. They prevent the speedy settlement of unpleasant impressions made in election struggles on the minds of men who ought, as far as possible, to dwell together in unity, and join hands in a hundred ways for the common good.

"Of course, there are cases which demand judicial intervention in the interests of purity of election, and there are times when it may seem best to use every lawful means for the avoidance, if possible, of some particular contest. But such cases are now few and far between, and in the present situation depends on making vacant by the decree of a judge any seat whatever in the new Parliament. Under ordinary circumstances, too, the election business is likely to prove unprofitable for the contesting party. Candidates' agents are commonly as fallible and peccable on one side as the other. They stand alike in an election contest in slippery places, every little possible slip on one side, is pretty sure to be brought to light, and the consequence is that they are equally liable to fall. The news ought to understand that the petitioners in the Northumberland matter do not admit that they are fallible. They claim to be whole-souled, high-minded honorable, pure, just, righteous, law-abiding and generally unimpeachable. How "Old Nick" and scores of electors whose votes they purchased, or attempted to purchase, must laugh at their hypocrisy.

A correspondent of the Telegraph says: "Whilst, as regards the several cases referred to in this issue, the extreme partisans on either side can scarcely be for any alteration of existing regulations; they may most certainly conclude that their mutual animosity will succeed in largely inducing suspicion for defence, estrangement for friendship, and permanent social rupture for temporary political feeling take with them, ere long, having finally done away. I hope, therefore, before these cases go too far, wise counsels will prevail; for, if these are persisted in, they will cause more bitterness than all the combined exhortations of the pulpit to mutual forbearance together with the example of Christian men, will be able to undo for a generation. It is by consequence with the confident hope that the gentlemen employed as counsel will endeavor to convince and persuade their clients--if they will not consent to be convinced, and to which their own judgment must strongly incline them--that there is an ancient maxim in law which applies to this instance with great force and significance "Quita non movet;" the sense and meaning of which is very well expressed in the common saying-- "Let sleeping dogs lie."
