It is so ordered that each one must do for himself if he would succeed however much he may be aided, for the best that outside influence can do only to aid. The mere attainment of knowledge is not sufficient; there must be an improvement of the facultiesthe man himself must be developedand this can be accomplished only by self-exertion. Knowledge thus acquired makes a more permanent impression, is more clearly seen and felt, and becomes, as it were, a part of the man, building him up, arming him for the battle of life, as well as preparing him for its enjoyment. What we get ourselves we are apt to treasure, and we get it in such a manner that it fits us the better, suited as it will be to our individuality. It is afault of our schools that there is not sufficient chance afforded for independent reflection upon what is presented, so that its arrangement may take form in harmony with the peculiarity of the individual. Individuality of character is ignored only at the expense of the individual, begetting an abnormal condition which is neither true enjoyment nor the means of securing success. The pupil, under his teacher, is too often burdened with tasks which discourage and beget a mechanical habit. His faculties not keeping pace in their development with the weight of material he is made, unnaturally, to carry, he finds himself unequal to dispose of them, and thus is made to bear a load which unfits him for the active purposes of life, which otherwise. with sufficient time and encouragement for deliberation, he could have carried out with success.

Crime in Cities and small Towns

Some criminal statistics recently published in the Times greatly discredit the popular idea that habitual criminals are mainly the product of great cities. In Manchester, no doubt, 16 out of every 10,000 belong to that class, and in Liverpool 11; but in London there are only 4, and in Taunton, sleepiest of little towns, they rise to 17. Of course the last figure may be accidental, but the proportion of crime, though not, of course, the aggregate mass of crime, in London has always been low, partly from the vigilance of the police, partly from the number of careers open to the inhabitants, and partly from the quicker intelligence which is only generated in great cities. We wish one of our abler statists would give the world a careful paper on the comparative morality of great capitals and rural districts. It would, we believe, materially alter public opinion upon the subject. Crimes of malignity, in particular, such as fire raising, flourish chiefly in rural districts and petty towns, as do also rapes and all crimes of violence not dictated by a wish to obtain property.-London Spec-

TURKISH WIVES .- Having obtained a wife, it is worth while to inquire how a Turk treats her. She has much to complain of generally from the ill-treatment of her husband. As a rule the Turk is a fair husband. The Turk in ordinary life is not unkind or cruel .-The wife's misfortunes arise from her position. As husband and wife see little of each other, they are not specially given to quarrelling. But she is a woman, possibly purchased outright in the slave-market—for it is pure illusion to suppose that the slave trade in Turkey has been abolished—and being a woman, she bears about her on every hand the marks of degradation. It is her duty to wait on her husband, if he be poor, at meals. Her accommodation in the house is inferior to his. In all things she is a slave. If the wife is the daughter of a wealthy man, her lot is LUNG BALSAM! not a hard one. As the law regards marriage merely as a partnership, she keeps her own property, and the husband has to be on his good behavior to obtain a share of it. If she is of poor origin, she can scarcely be said to have any rights. When a harem is on board a vessel, the husband keeps in the saloon living well and sleeping in a comfortable cabin. The poor women are penned up as deck-passengers, living on wretched food which they take with them .-"Only a few weeks ago," says a traveller, "I was in a steamer carrying a harem, where there were probably twenty women, wives and slaves, who were shivering under canvas, which was quite insufficient to keep out the pelting rain. I know that it is a thing almost unknown for a harem to have cabins N taken for it. The husband takes care of himself-has, perhaps, unlimited champagne—and leaves his women huddled together on deck to take care of themselves."

WHAT OATMEAL DOES .- Liebig has shown that oatmeal is almost as nutritious as the very best English beef, and that it is richer than wheaten bread in the elements that go to form bone and muscle. Prof. Forbes, of Edinburgh, during some twenty years, measured breath and height and also tested the strength of both the arms and loins of the students of the university-a very numerous class, and of various nationalities, drawn to Edinburgh by the fame of his teaching. He found that in height, breadth of chest and shoulders, and strength of arms and loins, the Belgians were at the bottom of the list; a little above them, the French; very much higher, the English; and highest of all, Scotch and Scotch-Irish from Ulster, who, like the natives of Scotland, are fed in their early years with at least one meal a day of good oatmeal porridge.

A STEAM TREE CUTTER. - A steam tree-cutter is the latest invention. Capital and Labor describes some recent experiments in which a new machine for felling timber was successfully tested. The instrument consists of a cylinder and piston, the rod of which is directly connected with a strong saw blade working horizontally. The cylinder rests on a solid framework or foundation which is fixed in the ground close to the tree, and the blade is kept in its place by firm chains attached to the trunk to be operated upon. A supply of steam is, of course, provided, and when everything is in position the engine is started and works itself. A very few minutes are said to have been occupied in cutting through the largest tree, and it is plain that if the sucess achieved was conclusive, the new saw must come into general use.
